Sex Murder Charge Denied by Ex-Officer

DALLAS Ore., July 22.—(AP)—Richard Harry Layton, former Independence, Ore., police officer under indictment for the rape-slashing of 17-year-old Ruth Hill debrand of Dallas, pleaded innocent today.

Circuit Judge E. M. Page set August 9 as trial date.

Layton, arrested two weeks ago, admitted to state police Capt. Vayne Gurdane at Portland that he raped the girl and that he later slapped her and she fell into the Willamette river. He said he could not attempt a rescue because he was unable to swim.

Labor Heads Warn Of Revolt if Cost Of Living Not Cut

WASHINGTON, July 22.—(AP)—Organized labor service today it will demand removal of Price Administrator Prentiss Brown and scrapping of the "little steel" wage formula if prices are not rolled back to the September 15, 1942, level, as stipulated by congress and the administration.

William Green, president of the AFL, and Philip Murray, head of the CIO, joined in this statement today after a meeting between President Roosevelt and the combined Labor War board.

Green said the threat to seek Brown's removal was not made to the president, but that the labor leaders did emphasize to the chief executive that unless prices are reduced they will demand that the War Labor board east overboard the little steel formula under which wage increases of 15 per cent are permitted to compensate for rises in the cost of living since Jan. 1, 1941.

Prices Rise, Wages Held

Green said Brown and other price and wage stabilization agencies had failed to check rising prices with the result that wages "are practically frozen and prices are soaring."

Labor's acceptance of the sta-

bilization program, Green told reports, was based on the assumption that both prices and wages would be stabilized.

Murray said no deadline had been set in their conference with the president, but he hoped something satisfactory will be worked out by the time the group sees the president again at an early date.

He said the group emphasized to the president the "utter futility of continuing the present hold-the-line order in the presence of rising prices and the obvious unwillingness of certain administrative agencies to make effective the commitments of congress to maintain prices at the September level."

In a formal statement by the labor leaders after the White House call they said they were unable to find any steps being taken to carry out the administration objective.

"If your administrators have decided not to carry out in full the program which you proposed and which congress permits," the statement said, "it will, of course, be impossible for organized labor to continue in its support of the wage and price stabilization program as now formulated."

Rockaway, Oregon's newest incorporated city, has a population of 616, Secretary of State Farrell announced today after his department took a census. The census was taken so the city could participate in the distribution of liquor and highway fees.

Douglas County's Budget Receiving Final Inspection

The Douglas county court is today making final study of the county budget for the fiscal year, following the annual public hearing held Wednesday. The hearing had the least public attendance since the budget law was enacted, as travel restrictions, farm work etc., kept many members of the Douglas County Taxpayers league, which usually furnishes a large audience, from attending.

The league's recommendations were few, including resolutions of public assistance to fill needed defense positions, particularly with the Aircraft Warning service, if physically able to do so; require competitive bids in connection with sale of county-owned timber; force loggers buying county-owned lands to log each section clearly before moving to the next tract; take added precautions against road damage through loading and dragging logs on right of way, and using diligence to prevent garbage being dumped along county roads. While these resolutions have no bearing on the budget, the county court is taking the suggestions under advisement.

Restoration of an item of \$250,

sought by J. Roland Parker, county agent, to continue the grass nursery experiments, is being considered, together with a request from Sheriff O. T. Carter for a monthly wage of \$40 for the jail matron.

The final form of the budget must be determined by the county court, following consideration of any proposed changes presented at the public hearing.

Tavern Bandits Shoot Patron Without Warning

MILWAUKIE, Ore., July 22.—(AP)—A tavern customer was shot in the back without warning early today by one of two hold-up men who escaped with more than \$200 in cash and a \$113 check.

The wounded man, Ralph Dahlen, 27, Milwaukie, was in a critical condition at a Portland hospital.

State Police Sgt. Guy Watkins said the two holdup men entered the tavern through different doors. One of them shot Dahlen, who was eating, then ordered all patrons and employees to put their wallets on the counter.

Watkins said the man who fired the shot was described as between 30 and 35 years of age, over six feet tall and weighing 175 to 180 pounds. He wore overalls, a jumper and a dark hat. His companion, about the same age, was shorter, had a mustach and wore a dark suit.

New Camps to Be Built For Prisoners of War

WASHINGTON, July 22.—(AP)—So that many of the 267,000 axis prisoners captured in north Africa may be moved to this country "as quickly as possible", new internment camps are to be built throughout the United States and existing ones are to be enlarged.

In announcing those plans yesterday, the war department disclosed that 65,058 axis prisoners now are interned in 38 camps in this country, and that the capacity of camps already built is 139,164.

Prisoners already interned include 45,355 Germans, 19,641 Italians and 62 Japanese.

All Civilian Elements Aid in Kansas Harvest

TOPEKA, Kas., July 22.—(AP)—Women, boys and girls comprise about 90 per cent of the crews harvesting the Kaw valley potato crop, Governor Andrew Schoepel reported in praising Kansas youth for helping to relieve farm labor shortages.

The governor also cited the work of businessmen who donated their time to help in the harvest fields.

"I think the example on the 23 Lawrence men who shocked 75 acres of oats in three and one-half hours is typical of the work businessmen all over Kansas have been doing," he said.
