Kissling's mill has started working at 6 a. m. and quitting at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. They will continue working these hours during the warm weather.

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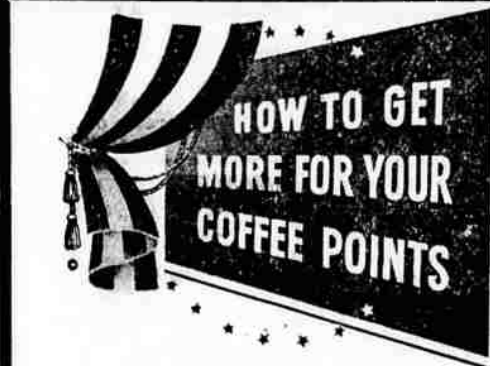
