

Treasury Issues Bad News—\$10,000 Bills Get Scarce

WASHINGTON, July 22.—(AP)—Of all the things to have to worry about, now the treasury comes along with the disheartening announcement that \$10,000 bills are getting scarce.

Nearly 4,000 of the longest of this country's long green have found their way back into the treasury in the past two and one-half years. There are fewer than 2,200 at large.

The rise and decline in popularity of the big notes follows a pattern that can be traced to darkening war clouds and the imposition of stringent government monetary controls.

When there is a demand for the big bills, officials attribute some of it to desire on the part of some foreign nationals to convert their assets into the most compact form of cash.

The government some time ago turned a more critical eye on such dealings and added new and sharper controls. Then the notes began to flow back into the banks. The latter, in turn, converted them into smaller currencies.

Thus, while the number of \$10,000 bills in circulation was declining from a high of 6,029 in July 1940, other denomination notes grew sharply in volume to keep pace with the vast amount of cash generated by the ever-increasing tempo of war production.

In the last year alone that cash rose more than \$5,000,000,000 to a record total of more than \$17,400,000,000. During that period the number of \$1 bills increased by 120,000,000, \$5 bills rose more than 70,000,000, twenties by 80,000,000 and \$1,000 notes by 54,000.

Even the so-called "unlucky" \$2 bills grew in demand until 7,000,000 new ones swelled the total in circulation to 29,500,000.

Mrs. Earl Smith and Miss Thelma Smith were attending to business matters in Myrtle Creek Friday afternoon.

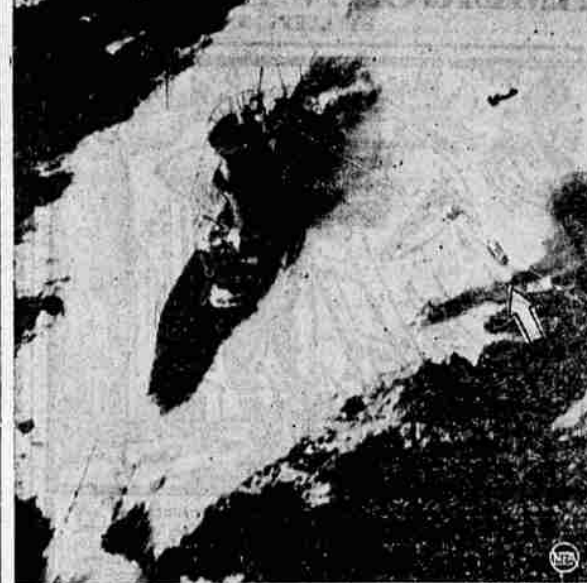
Mrs. Guy Townsend and daughter, Norma, returned Friday from Eugene where they had been for several days consulting a specialist for Norma's eyes.

Huge Turkey Supply for Overseas Forces Sought

CHICAGO, July 21.—(AP)—Uncle Sam wants to make sure that his fighting men abroad get plenty of turkey on Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's day.

The war food administration asked the poultry industry Tuesday to provide 10,000,000 pounds of turkey meat in the late summer and early fall for shipment overseas.

Simultaneously, it requested processors, packers, hotel and restaurant operators and consumers to refrain from selling, serving or eating turkey for a few weeks in August and September until the requirements for the military forces on the war fronts are met.
