## Young Chicken Output Sets All-Time Record

**WASHINGTON, July 26 (AP)**—The Agriculture department said today young chickens raised on farms in 1943 reached an all-time peak estimated at 925,625,000 birds. This was 16 per cent larger than the previous high of last year and 36 per cent above the 1932-41 average. The increase in chickens raised this year, the department said, was caused by the favorable relationship between chicken and egg prices and feed prices. The report said the majority of the chickens were obtained by farmers from hatcheries.
