HOLLYWOOD, July 26.—(AP) Willie Joyce of Gary, Ind., has a fractured jaw for evidence that Henry Armstrong's comeback aspirations in the prizefight ring are considerably more than wishful thinking.

The 31-year-old veteran Armstrong won a 10-round decision over Joyce Saturday evening.

Many Observation Posts in rural areas are suffering from manpower shortages... and the Filter and Information Centers need help. Join this select corps of unsung heroes and heroines who are protecting our vital American frontier. You are needed, despite glowing reports about the magic radio detection device known as Radar; that instrument whom some people infer is the answer for detecting the enemy.
