Boring Company Installs Optical Lens Laboratory

The Boring Optical company announced today the installation of their optical lens laboratory at their quarters at 225 N. Jackson St. The laboratory has been moved here from Marshfield, where it has been maintained previously. Much new equipment has been added to provide one of the largest and best equipped plants in the state.

Included in the machinery installed here is an instrument which permits duplication of any lens if a small fragment of the broken glass is obtainable.

The laboratory is able to grind lenses to any prescription and is complete in every particular. John Kolb and Mrs. Renaldo Hodge, technicians, have moved from Marshfield to Roseburg and will be in charge of the plant. Mr. Kolb has been associated with the company for more than eight years, while Mrs. Hodge has had more than three years of service with the company.

The laboratory has a sub-contract with a large wholesale supply company which is furnishing lenses to the military services on government contract. Dr. E. E. Boring reports. However, local demands will receive first attention and any reserve capacity will be used in meeting the sub-contract, he states.
