NEW CRATES IN BRITAIN BOON TO HOUSEWIVES

LONDON—(AP)—Scientists of the British Coal Utilization Research Association have produced a domestic grate which is the answer to the housewife's prayer. Once lit it can be kept on indefinitely. The ashes need be removed only once a week. It radiates 45 per cent of the heat in fuel, instead of the 25 per cent of the ordinary grate and reduces consumption of fuel by 500 per cent.

Fitzsimmons Succeeds Harris as Phillies' Boss

PHILADELPHIA, July 28—(AP)—Freddie Fitzsimmons took over direction of the slumping Philadelphia Phillies today in place of Stanley R. (Bucky) Harris, who described himself as "shocked" by the first managerial change of the major league season.

"To 'fat Freddie,' who broke into organized baseball the same year and with the same team as Harris—in 1916 with Muskegon, Mich., of the old Central league—his first major league managership came as 42nd birthday gift.

"I consider it a great honor, naturally, to become a major league manager and I believe the Philadelphia club has great possibilities," the veteran Brooklyn pitcher-coach said after the Phillies' board of directors announced he would take over "in the best interests of the successful operation of the club."
