**Klamath County Clerk Is Freed of Charges**

OREGON CITY, Ore., July 29 — (AP) — Three indictments charging Klamath County Clerk Mrs. Mae K. Short with illegally accepting county warrants were dismissed with prejudice yesterday by Circuit Judge Latourette. The decision prevents the Klamath Falls grand jury from indicting Mrs. Short again on the charge. Judge Latourette, who took the case when Judge Vandenberg disqualified himself, decided that two \$25 warrants Mrs. Short received from the county court for extra election work, and \$50 the Klamath county dog commission paid her for secretarial work, was for after-hour tasks and was legitimate.

## Hunters Expected To Use Shells on Pest Eradication

WASHINGTON, July 29 — (AP) — Standard equipment for hunting this fall should include one conscience. Blasting away at game just for the heck of it will be considered unpatriotic. What's more, if that's your idea when you buy shells, keep it to yourself or the hardware clerk is entitled to ring up "no sale." You're supposed only to kill off "pests" that prey on crops.

A few weeks ago, officials dealing with such government interests as how much material to allot hunters for the impending season, indicated that the army of nimrods could expect a little ammunition — none to throw away, but enough to have some sport.

Today, however, some authorities in the War Production board showed an inclination to qualify that in this way.

Hunters probably will get "limited quantities" of ammunition but not for sport purposes, purely.

They must sternly repress any pleasure and remember they are out to prevent crop damage from too-pentiful numbers of game. Farmers and ranchers get ammunition at present for "pest control," and just plain hunters probably will be allowed to shoot for somewhat the same reason.

Although huge quantities of hunting-size ammunition is being manufactured, it is absorbed by the army air force and other branches of the military for training gunners.

The WPB is working out a plan so that ammunition can be released for areas where crop damage is impending or existing. A "definite statement" will be made within a week, WPB men promised.

## Red Pincers Tightened On Germans at Orel

fought viciously the red army retained the initiative at all points. Altogether, the Russians said they overran 30 occupied places, left more than 2,500,000 dead upon the field, and knocked out 29 German tanks yesterday in the Orel sector alone.

(The Berlin radio yesterday acknowledged the German withdrawal from Bolkhov, 31 miles above Orel, which the Russians announced last week they had captured. It was evacuated, the broadcast said, as a part of their "elastically conducted defense fighting.")

(Hitler's high command declared all enemy attempts at a breakthrough in the Orel sector were repulsed yesterday, and that 168 red army tanks were knocked out along the whole front.)

Joel W. Payne, 72, died this morning at his home in Edenbower following a long period of illness. A retired newspaperman, he was one of the first to pioneer poultry raising on a large scale in Douglas county. Surviving are his wife, a brother, Frank Payne, Hayward, Calif., and a sister, Mrs. Walter Lovejoy, Hoquiam, Wash. The body will be taken by the Roseburg Undertaking company.
