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### NO NEED FOR PANIC

**PAY-AS-YOU-GO** income tax deductions reveal that a great many families do not operate on the approved budget system. To those who have budgeted their income in the past, the pay-as-you-go plan affords the opportunity of crossing off one of the items for which savings were regularly included and makes little change in other entries.

But, judging from the many complaints we hear, it is quite evident the number of families budgeting income taxes in the past have been few and far between. To most of us the 15th of March has meant a mad scramble to meet Uncle Sam's demands, with, perhaps, a loan on the insurance policy, the demolition of Junior's piggy bank, and the pawning of the family silver an occasional necessity.

We are frightened by the smaller sum appearing on the payroll check, or contained in the pay envelope. With living costs rising, we are panicked into believing we must dodge the bill collector. But a little thought will reveal our panic to be merely a psychological effect resulting from our past failure to handle our personal finances in an orderly manner. Uncle Sam is merely forcing us to budget our income tax payments. When March 15 rolls around again we will be delighted to find the silverware in its place and Junior's bank intact on the accustomed shelf. In fact, some people, instead of owing money to Uncle Sam, will find they have saved a few dollars in the form of a surplus remittance. And what a grand and glorious feeling that will be.

Not for the boy who is dying tonight, but because he is dying, we can make our sacrifices to the cause of freedom.

### Oregon's Food Output Aided by Federal Loans

CORVALLIS, July 30 (AP)—Loans to assist 1,142 Oregon farmers finance food production this year were supplied by means of the new Regional Agricultural corporation and handled through county USDA War boards, according to a report by the State War Board office.

These loans were used by farmers to finance production on 38,800 acres of 42 different crops and to handle 76,673 head of livestock and poultry. The loans were provided early this year to encourage the taking of higher risks by growers and thus bring maximum food production. The largest acreage of a single crop financed was 16,430 acres of dry cow peas.

### Store Ends Display Of Service Men's Pictures

Gray Elliott, manager of the local J. C. Penney company store, announced this morning that the window showing Douglas county boys in service, which has been maintained at his store for the last month, is being taken out today. About 1000 service men's pictures have been on display and Mr. Elliott states that he is especially appreciative for the cooperation given by residents in making the display possible. Mr. Elliott has asked persons having pictures in the display to call at the store balcony as soon as possible to get their pictures.

### Apprenticeship Head For Oregon Appointed

SALEM, Ore., July 30 (AP)—W. R. Volhey, who for six years has been chief electrical inspector for the state bureau of labor, was appointed by Governor Snell yesterday to be Oregon's first director of apprenticeship. The position was created by the 1943 legislature, and duties of the director will be to serve as secretary of the state apprenticeship council, and to encourage, promote and keep records of apprenticeship agreements. Volhey will continue as chief electrical inspector, and will get an additional salary for the apprenticeship position.

Nine men were killed and one injured when a four-engine bomber crashed ten miles east of Biggs field last night.

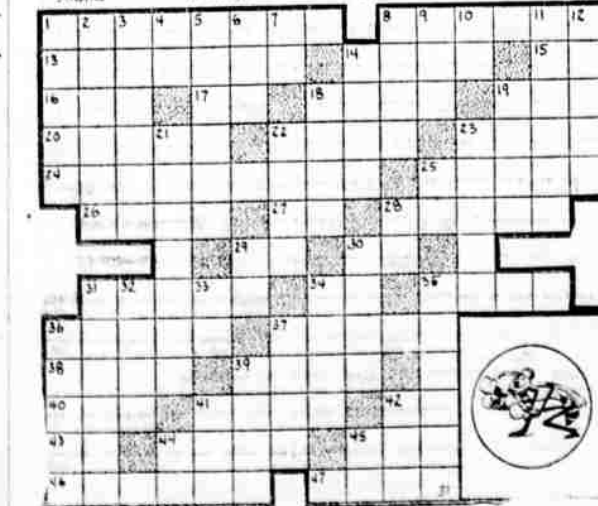

**4,000 Pickers Needed For Yamhill Bean Crop**  
 McMinnville, Ore., July 30—(AP)—A record crop of beans will be ready for harvesting next week in Yamhill county but much of it will be lost unless more pickers are found, emergency Farm Labor Assistant William J. Maxwell said yesterday.

Average pickers can earn at least \$1 an hour, he said. The U. S. employment service has issued a call for 4,000 women and older children. Workers are being registered by the service here and at Newberg, and at the FSA migratory farm labor camp near Dayton. Buses will transport workers to the fields from towns of the area.
