Beer Shortage Revives Home Brew Activity

PORTLAND, July 30.—(AP)—Home brew bubbles again in the basements of hundreds of Portland homes, the Oregonian reported today.

Brewing equipment in disuse since prohibition has been dusted off and set to work to meet the beer shortage, the paper said. Grocers are doing a big business in mail syrup, yeast and bottle caps, but report a shortage of hops and a complete absence of home capping machines and 10-gallon crocks.

WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in my judgment, a menace to life and property on account of the high fire hazard caused by an excessive number of stags and inflammable debris on the ground due to logging operations and old burns; and

WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester, it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following area designated as:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, EARL SNELL, governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107-209, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 238, Oregon Laws 1941, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described area to be unlawful and that said area shall be subject to entry only through permit to be issued by the State Forester, or a fire warden, under which permit entrant shall comply with any and all of the following requirements:

(a) To build no fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.

(b) To have as a part of his or her equipment tools suitable for extinguishing fire.

(c) To refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit.

This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 20th day of July, 1943, and shall remain in full force and effect until the 31st day of December, 1943.

Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 17th day of July, 1943.

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Top Ace Pilot Of S. W. Pacific Runs His Score to 17

SOMEWHERE IN NEW GUINEA, July 29.—(AP)—First Lieut. Richard Bong of Poplar, Wis., top fighter ace of the Southwest Pacific area, added two more Japanese planes to his score today.

Bong, Capt. James A. Watkins of Crystal Springs, Miss., another ace, and their P-38 mates knocked out six enemy fighters off the northwest coast of New Britain without loss, and possibly destroyed an additional two.

The young Wisconsin flier, who only two days previously shot down four Japanese planes, raised his total from 15 to 17 today and was credited with a third possible.

The Lightnings were escorting a formation of B-25's which bombed and strafed shipping from Arawe on the south coast of New Britain to Rein bay. The Mitchells destroyed at least two Japanese vessels and seven barges.

Meanwhile, it was disclosed there were so many Johnsons in fighter outfits that the wrong Johnson was credited with destroying two Zeros July 26, when Bong and Watkins each got four. Credit was erroneously given

First Lieut. Clarence Johnson of San Bernardino, Calif. Actually, it developed, First Lieut. G. R. Johnson of Eugene, Ore., as the pilot who destroyed both planes. Johnson (of Oregon) also has on his record the probable destruction of a Zero July 23 when two other members of his unit, First Lieut. Charles Ralph Covington, Tenn., and Second Lieut. Ralph Wandrey, Mason City, Iowa, pulled down one each.

The same Johnson destroyed two Zeros in combat in the Alaskan theater a year ago.
