ROSEBURG WOMAN'S CLUB TO SPONSOR FOOD PRESERVATION CLASSES

The Roseburg Woman's club will sponsor the food preservation project classes to be held in this city beginning Monday, August 1, and continuing through Friday, August 6, at the home economics department in the junior high school building. Women's civic organizations here will assist.

All women desiring to attend the class sessions are requested to call the superintendent's office at 434.

Miss Betty Johnson, home economics instructor from the state department of vocational home economics education, assisted by Homer Grow, local vocational agricultural instructor, will be in charge.

Ten pressure cookers are needed for the class demonstrations and persons willing to loan their cookers for the sessions are asked to telephone 411-L.

Miss Johnson will arrive here Monday and will be heard on an interview on the Wheel of Fortune program over KRNR at 11 a. m. The first class session will be held from 2 to 4 o'clock in the afternoon at the junior high school, at which time demonstrations and a discussion of dehydration and freezing of fruits and vegetables will be held.

Tuesday, August 2, from 8:30 to 12 o'clock, preparation for the afternoon session on the use of pressure cooker for canning non-acid vegetables and meats, will be made. Telephone calls on food preservation problems may be called in during the morning. The afternoon session will be held from 2 to 4 o'clock and foods will be cooked by pressure cooker.

Wednesday, August 3, women are asked to make appointments through the superintendent's office by calling 434 to make arrangements for assistance in canning with the pressure cooker. As many women will use the school laboratory as can be supervised effectively by Miss Johnson.

Thursday, August 4, women may go to the junior high laboratory and can under qualified supervision. Calls will again be received assisting home canners. The afternoon session will be from 1 to 4 o'clock and the discussion and demonstration will be on canning fruits and making jellies and jams.

Friday, August 5, the morning session will be devoted to canning fruits and vegetables by the class and from 1 to 3 the laboratory will be cleaned and the instructor will be available for conferences on problems relative to food preservation.

Home-makers all over the nation are helping the war effort by improving their own food problems and in making preparations for canning large quantities of fruits, vegetables and meats to take care of the coming fall and winter months. All women interested in preservation of foods are most cordially invited to take advantage of this project being offered during the coming week.

This program is not being offered for underprivileged only, but for all persons interested and the representatives from the state department of home economics will be here to assist with this vital project.

Persons loaning pressure cookers are requested to place their names on the cookers.

WAC RECRUITERS TO BE IN ROSEBURG ON AUGUST 3-4-5

Boasting full fledged "membership" in the United States army and with age limits changed by congress to permit the enlistment of women from 20 to 49 years of age inclusive, a squad of WAC recruiters will invade Roseburg on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, August 3, 4 and 5 in a big army mobile recruiting unit. They will have all the answers to the many questions women have been asking in regard to the new requirements and opportunities of the feminine khaki-clads.

Announcement of the coming visit by the recruiters from Portland's WAC headquarters came from Mrs. Ethel Roseland, who is acting as local representative for the women's army corps.

Those wishing complete enlistment information are asked to visit the mobile unit which can be easily located in the downtown district.

Colonel J. J. Fulmer, commander of the Oregon recruiting district, has explained that the war department now considers the women's army as part of the total strength of the regular army and also considers that one out of every ten army jobs can be performed by the feminine soldiers. He added that definite opportunities are now available for rapid promotion in both the commissioned and non-commissioned ranks.

Under their new "full army" status WACs now receive all the privileges offered the male members of the armed services. These include valuable training in fields which will offer post-war employment, free mailing rights, additional pay for overseas duty, as well as complete medical care and the right to acquire National Service Life insurance.
