Eighteen Bills By Holman Wait Congress' Action

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 — (AP) — When Senator Holman (R-Ore.) returns to Washington from his vacation in his home state he will be confronted with the task of trying to get congress to enact 18 bills he has introduced in the first six months of the 76th congress.

Holman is an active member of the senate appropriations committee where he exerted his influence to get funds for fighting forest fires increased to \$12,000,000 from \$6,000,000, increased money for forest research, and additional funds for the Klamath reclamation projects, the Deschutes project and for the small water conservation projects, including the Bully creek project, which will be allotted about \$500,000. He also had a hand in restoring to the interior department appropriation bill funds for the Bonneville power administration.

Among the measures which Holman has pending before committees are those to exclude certain aliens from the United States; to provide punishment for persons who escape or attempt to escape from officers or employees of the immigration service, passed by the senate and now is before a house committee; to consolidate the function of furnishing legal advice to government agencies in the justice department; to provide for the separation from the armed services of men whose services would be more valuable to the war effort in certain essential civilian activities; to release members of the armed forces to aid in agricultural production; to provide for agricultural research and for further development of agriculture extension work and more complete endowment and support of land-grant colleges; to provide for establishment and maintenance of forest products pilot plants; to issue a special postage stamp in honor of the 100th anniversary of the founding of civil government in the west and the blazing of the Oregon trail; proposing an amendment to the constitution to grant equal rights to men and women; authorizing investigation of the preparation and distribution of motion pictures, magazines and periodicals by government agencies.

In addition to his work on the senate appropriations committee the senator is a member of the District of Columbia committee, the Immigration committee, Military Affairs committee, Public Lands and Surveys and a special senate committee on fiscal affairs of the government.

Special Awards Made To Azalea AWS Corps

AZALEA, Aug. 3 — Many awards have been presented to the members of the Azalea Ground Observer Corps.

Mrs. Rollin Johns has been awarded service medal for over 7,500 hours duty at the observation post. Mrs. Johns was greatly surprised to receive a letter from Sam Hays, noted newscaster, stating that she had been selected for citation on their breakfast news program for outstanding work on the home battle front. This citation will be made Monday, Aug. 9 at 7:45 a. m.

She will also receive a certification of appreciation signed by the governors of four western states, which will represent a lasting memento of the work she has done.

Chief Observer Rollin Johns has been awarded the silver star for serving in that capacity for more than a year and a half. Although an invalid for several years he keeps the post operating very efficiently, as well as serving many hours on duty at the post.

T. C. Johns was recently awarded the 1000 hour medal. Although Mr. Johns is nearly seventy years old he takes a two-hour watch daily.
