This is the first of a series of newspaper columns devoted exclusively to news of the AWS and the people who serve the United States Army Air Forces through the observation posts.

We hope we will have a column of interest for all observers with special mention of the activities of the men and women volunteers and accounts of their outstanding services.

There are a lot of things that happen around the posts that do not get into the papers, and those are the things we want to stress in this column. If you know of anyone who has done something outstanding, or if you have had a unique experience at one time or another, we'd like to hear about it so we can write it into the next column.

For instance, down in Oregon City the chief observer, Henry Hodes, is an elevator operator in the courthouse, and serving him on the post are some of the high ranking county officials including the county clerk, the sheriff, district attorney, assistant D. A., etc., so the elevator man out-ranks his superiors in this particular instance.

Then there is the case of Margaret Snively up at Hood river post, who served a shift from 9:30 p. m. until 8 a. m. the next day when the big snow last January made travel virtually impossible. She entered on the log book the following: 9:30 p. m. to midnight . . . no planes; midnight to 4 a. m. . . no sleep; 4 a. m. to 6 a. m. . . no feeling.

Some of the posts are keeping a private log or diary of the post, and each set of observers jot down little items of interest to the community in which the post is situated. They do say that these diaries are mighty interesting reading and the latest dope on all the observers is available for perusal during the long watches when planes are few.

The aircraft recognition schools seem to be very popular and it is getting to the point where hardly a plane flies over but that some observer somewhere will be able to say, "That's a B-25, B-17, P-39," as the case might be. Knowing the kind of plane that flies over the post adds a bit of spice to the watches. Since I serve midnight to 3 a. m. shift on a post in Oregon, I'm afraid that knowing the planes won't do me much good while on duty, as we just cannot distinguish them at night, but in the daytime while at work, I can pick 'em out and name them occasionally.

State General Fund to Get Tool Rental Money

SALEM, Aug. 3—(AP)—The Battleship Oregon commission is receiving \$100 a month rent for tools which were on the old ship, but the commission cannot use the money to pay expenses of the battleship Oregon museum in Portland, Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle ruled today.

The money, he ruled, must be paid to the state treasurer and placed in the state general fund. The legislature appropriated money to maintain the museum.

The tools are being leased to an Oregon corporation which is manufacturing machinery items for military and naval purposes.

The ship, famed for her dash around the Horn in the Spanish American war, was taken from Portland to Kalama, Wash., several months ago for scrapping.

Alarming Drop Listed In Number Milk Dealers

SALEM, Aug. 3—(AP)—The number of licensed milk dealers in Oregon has dropped from 469 to 314 since Jan. 1, 1942, State Director of Agriculture Ervin L. Peterson said today.

He said the milk supply is rapidly diminishing, while the demand is increasing steadily.

Lane county has lost 21 milk dealers in the past 18 months, while Clackamas county was the second high loser with 18 less. Multnomah county lost 17 dealers and Columbia county 12.

Wasco county had the highest percentage of decrease, its milk dealers decreasing from 10 to 2.

Salem Mounted Posseman Killed in Fall From Horse

SEATTLE, Aug. 3—(AP)—Injuries suffered Sunday while participating in the great western horse show here were fatal yesterday to Luther M. Ramage, 37, of Salem, Ore.

Ramage was thrown when his horse collided with another ridden by Van Weider, also of Salem. Weider escaped with minor injuries.

Both were members of the Salem mounted posse.

Montana Dropped From Oregon State Schedule

CORVALLIS, Aug. 3—(AP)—The University of Montana will be dropped from the Oregon State football schedule this fall, to be replaced by the Spokane air service command team.

Athletic Director Percy Loeey said Montana may be unable to field a team this year because of the player shortage. The Spokane team will open the Oregon State schedule here October 9.



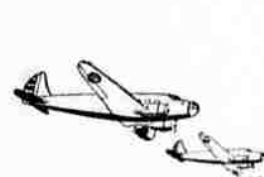
MEN 17-26 YOU CAN STILL BE AN AVIATION CADET

More and more pilots, bombardiers, and navigators are needed by Uncle Sam's rapidly growing air force. Planes are flowing from production lines -- air crews must be trained at the same pace.

1 If you are 18 to 26 years old, inclusive, and have not yet been called for induction under Selective Service, you may apply at once at the nearest Aviation Cadet Examining Board to take your physical and mental examinations. No school or college credits are required. If you pass the examinations and are found acceptable, you will be given a letter to the Armed Forces Induction Station requesting your assignment to the Army Air Forces upon induction. You may then volunteer for induction through your local Selective Service Board. After induction you will be assigned for preparatory training, upon completion of which you will receive your appointment as an Aviation Cadet and have an opportunity to become a Bombardier, Navigator or Pilot—one of the "Three Musketeers of the Air!"

2 If you have already been called for induction, you cannot apply direct for Aviation Cadet training. But, if you are assigned to the Army you have the same opportunity open to every soldier, 18 to 26 years old, inclusive, to apply for Aviation Cadet training after you are in the ranks.

3 If you are 17 but not yet 18, you can go now to your Aviation Cadet Examining Board and volunteer for enlistment in the Air Corps Cadet Reserve. Air Corps Enlisted Reservists are called to active duty for pre-flight training at the end of the first school semester after reaching the age of 18.
