Rex Applegate Author of New Military Manual

Major Rex Applegate of Roseburg is the author of a new military manual of hand-to-hand fighting, entitled, "Kill or Get Killed." Printed by the Military Publishing company of Harrisburg, Pa., the manual is intended for men of the military services and law enforcement officers only.

The book combines the principal features of Judo and jiu-jitsu, with later developments in hand-to-hand combat technique, and is written for the purpose of providing a textbook by which men of the armed services may be taught to protect themselves or operate on the offensive even though unarmed.

The preface points out that although expert instructors have been used by the military services to teach hand-to-hand combat methods, no complete text has previously appeared to afford a uniform basis for such instruction.

Profusely illustrated, the book outlines methods by which an unarmed man can defeat an armed assailant; maiming and killing technique and the proper use of close combat weapons.

The author, a graduate of Roseburg high school, is a son of Paul Applegate of Elkton and a nephew of Miss Verlie Tracy, principal of the Benson school in Roseburg. He made his home with his aunt while attending school here. He is a graduate of University of Oregon, where he was commissioned in the officer reserve, being called to active duty at the outbreak of the war.

He was in England for many months on special mission and studied Commando tactics. Upon his return to the United States he was made an instructor of military police, being promoted through the various grades to his present rank as major. He is assigned to military intelligence and is stationed in Washington, D. C.

His book is dedicated to Gus Peret, Yoncalla, expert rifleman, a close friend of the Applegate family.

National Forest Timber For Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, up to and not later than 10:00 A. M. August 14, 1943, for all the live and dead timber designated for cutting located on an area embracing about 110 acres within Lots 3, 4 and 5 and SE1 SW1, Section 6, T. 29 S., R. 2 W., W. M., South Myrtle Creek water-

shed, Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 700,000 feet B. M., more or less, of Douglas-fir, 50,000 feet B. M., more or less, of sugar pine, and 87,000 feet B. M., more or less, of Western hemlock, white fir, Western redcedar, and California incense cedar. No bid of less than \$2.80 per M feet of Douglas-fir, \$3.80 per M feet for sugar pine, and \$3.80 per M feet for all other species will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for the stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$25 per M feet B. M. to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash and snag disposal, and cooperative deposit of \$30 per M feet B. M. to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and forest improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cost of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$500.00 must be deposited with each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions

of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon. Before final award, the high bidder will be required to make a satisfactory showing of financial ability to carry out the agreement.
