Germans Expected to Try to Hold Balkans

CAIRO, Aug. 5.—(AP)—General Sir Henry Maitland Wilson, British commander in chief of the middle East, expressed doubt today that the Germans could hold the Balkans with their present forces in the event of an Italian collapse but was of the opinion that they would try as long as possible.

In answer to a question about speedy occupation of the Balkans, Wilson, who was commander of unsuccessful British forces in Greece in 1941, cautioned: "We can't use a magic carpet to get there."

Changed conditions will require a vast reorganization in the middle East, he explained, saying the main role of the middle East is to supply the North African striking forces.

Good Response Is Given Prize Money Canvass

Contributions are still needed, however, to bring the amount up to the \$500.

A. P. War Correspondent Is Awarded Commendation

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—John A. Moroso III, Associated Press correspondent with the Atlantic fleet, won a commendation today for his "courage" for attitude and resolution of purpose during the allied invasion of Sicily on the morning of July 10.

The commendation came from the commanding officer of the American transport to which Moroso was assigned. The officer recommended that Moroso be given the silver star medal or some other suitable award for his courageous participation in a combat action.

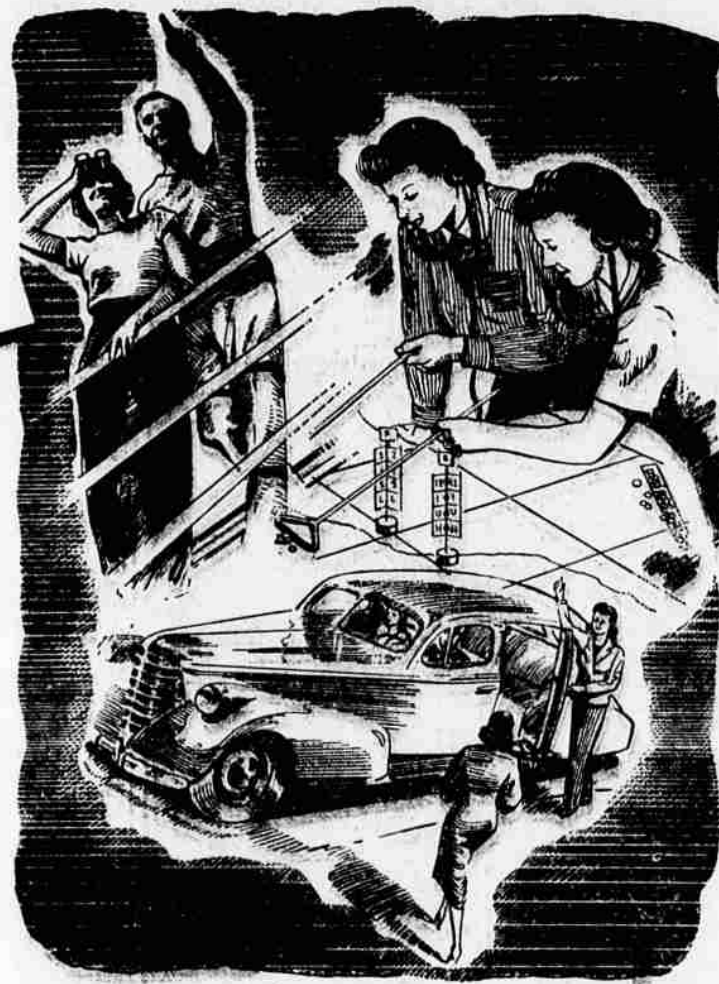
