The AIRCRAFT WARNING SERVICE

IS AN ESSENTIAL PART OF THE U. S. ARMY AIR FORCES

"She's in the center of things... the nerve center"

The young lady certainly is in the center of things... the nerve center of our whole air defense organization... the Aircraft Warning Filter Center.

The movement of every plane aloft in this area is charted before her very eyes on a large gridded map.

- She receives her reports from members of the Ground Observer Corps who stand watch on hundreds of Observation Posts on this Pacific Coast to report the movement of all aircraft over the landward areas.

- Her job is fascinating and vital to the safety of all of us. Because of her, and hundreds of women like her, planes and soldiers are released for combat service. Families sleep in safety knowing that they will be forewarned of enemy attack. Men work on ships and planes without fear of sudden and unexpected destruction falling from the sky.

- Yes, you bet she wears a pair of silver wings, and earns them. She is an essential part of the U. S. Army Air Forces and every man, woman and child in this area owe her a salute and vote of thanks.

150,000 loyal civilians know that Posts of the AWS must be filled. The job must be done by either civilians or by fliers or soldiers badly needed at our battle fronts. AWS volunteers release men and equipment for other duties.

The AWS volunteer is correct in assuming that he releases many planes to the front. If it weren't for the AWS we would need far more fighter planes on the Pacific Coast than we now have to do the same job.

"Seventy-five families depend on me" is what each AWS volunteer can truthfully say. Reliable statistics show that each person serving on a Ground Observation Post or in a Filter and Information Center is responsible for seventy-five homes as his share of protection.

Questions and Answers on the life and death question:

- Q. Is it true that this area is in danger of attack?
A. Emphatically yes! As our victories in the Pacific increase, our danger of being attacked becomes greater. U. S. Army officers admit: "It probably will happen here!"
- Q. When will such an attack most likely occur?
A. That, of course, is known only to our enemies. The Japs are crafty. Timing has been one of their trump cards. We can rest assured that they are receiving information about our morale, our degree of alertness. And we can be equally assured that the minute we let down our guard, the Japs will know about it and take lightning advantage of it.
- Q. Will we be forewarned?
A. Yes, thanks to the vigilance of thousands of fine, loyal volunteer workers in the Aircraft Warning Service. The amount of warning will vary, depending upon the nature of the attack. It may be short. Alertness will increase the warning.
- Q. Are more volunteers needed in the Aircraft Warning Service?
A. Yes, several hundred are needed at once.
- Q. Who can serve in the AWS?
A. Both men and women, as well as high school boys and girls, will find some branch of the Aircraft Warning Service to their liking.
- Q. What hours must I serve if I join the AWS?
A. That will depend upon you. You may choose the shift and day most convenient to you.
- Q. Does AWS work place me in the Army?
A. The Aircraft Warning Service is a non-military activity of the United States Army and while you are on duty you are under military supervision. However, you are still a civilian and may resign from the AWS at any time.
- Q. Where do I enlist?
A. The AWS volunteer procurement office can be reached by calling Roseburg 288.
