

Roosevelt and Churchill May Hold Meeting

Next Move in Allied Strategy Must be Planned Following Close of Sicilian Drive

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(AP)—A swift round of allied victories in Russia, Sicily and the air over Germany appears to have brought the war to a point where President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill must decide soon on the best strategy for shattering Hitler's European fortress.

In the past, decisions of such magnitude have been in personal conferences in Washington, or Casablanca, or aboard ship.

The present situation suggests that although the two leaders last met in Washington in May, they may find it necessary to confer again at an early date in order to give final shape to a victory campaign in Europe, weigh the prospects for an early victory and relate these prospects to the possibilities of speeding up the war in the Pacific.

News of Catania's fall, indicating the imminent collapse of all axis resistance in Sicily, was regarded here as posing the immediate problem of whether to fol-

low the Sicilian conquest with an invasion of Italy or whether to tighten up Premier Pietro Badoglio's strongholds by air first in hopes of forcing surrender without invasion.

Even more important ultimately is the question of whether to crush Germany by an aerial offensive alone or to employ a combined land-air strategy. If the main punch, the invasion army may have but to smash the outer walls of the continental defenses in order to have the whole thing collapse. The high command, it seems, must decide whether air can do the job.

Great Britain Has Fifth Night Without Bombing

LONDON, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Britain had another raid-free night last night extending to five days and five nights the time that has elapsed since a German plane was reported over the country. No air raid casualties have been reported for 22 days.

Food Poison Kills Child; 33 Treated

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 6.—(AP)—Two Eugene hospitals marshaled all facilities today in attempt to save the lives of 33 persons stricken with food poisoning, which caused the death of two-year-old Dale Mitchell, Lorane, yesterday.

Scattered reports from the southern Willamette valley indicated at least 48 persons were ill from eating cream-based pies and Dr. C. L. Lindgren, Lane county health officer, said he expected the number to increase.

Attendants at the hospitals said they were "too busy to talk" and late reports on the condition of patients were lacking. Lindgren said, however, that several were dangerously ill.

Lindgren said the poisoning had been traced to cultures developed in pies made by a Cottage Grove bakery, apparently due to inadequate refrigeration in their distribution or in their handling by customers. Sanitary conditions at the bakery were satisfactory, he said.
