Jap Submarine Rammed and Sunk By Patrol Chaser

SEATTLE, Aug. 10.—(AP)—A navy man whose patrol chaser literally rode a Japanese submarine's back told of his adventure here yesterday and ascribed its success to the fact he had made up his mind long in advance to ram any enemy submarine he caught on the surface — even though his ship's chances of survival in that event were only 50-50.

He is Lieut. W. Gordon Cornell, State Island, N. Y., commander of the patrol chaser 487, which the navy department in Washington disclosed had rammed and sunk a Japanese submarine in the Pacific.

When the 487's depth charge blew the sub to the surface, Lieut. Cornell was ready with his order.

"There it is, Ram the —"

he told his helmsman. And so they rammed the submarine, he told the Post-Intelligencer, and minutes later, after the rest of a fog-bound convoy had been treated to a "blow by blow" description of the battle of the 487's radio operator, came the "flash": "We have just sunk a Japanese submarine... we will blow our whistles at intervals."

The patrol chaser was considerably stove-in by the encounter but finally made port here under her own power. Lieut. Cornell received the navy cross for his daring, his executive officer was awarded the silver star as were two enlisted men for their work in keeping the boat afloat.

The 487 discovered the sub through her sounders and let go five depth charges, Cornell related.

lifted to the surface by the charges," he said.

The first blow tore both periscopes, antenna and the net cutter.

"The second time we rammed it just forward of the conning tower," the lieutenant said, "climbing right up on its back and hanging there nearly a minute. Our ship seemed to stick and pivot on top of the submarine and felt as though she would break in two. But the impact of the ram apparently rolled the submarine over and allowed the ship to slide away."

After the 487 was clear, Cornell said, the sub went down stern first in 2,200 fathoms of water.
