National Forest Timber for Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, up to 10:00 A. M., August 14, 1943, for all the Ponderosa Pine timber marked for cutting located on an area embracing about 1,390 acres within Section 20, 21, 22, 23, and 32, T. 28 S., R. 2 E., W. M., Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 500,000 feet B. M. more or less. No bid of less than \$3.00 per M feet will be considered. In addition to the price bid for the stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$55 per M feet B. M. to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash and snag disposal, and a cooperative deposit of \$20 per M feet B. M. to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and forest improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$500.00 must be deposited with each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon. Before final award, the high bidder will be required to make a satisfactory showing of financial ability to carry out the agreement.

GIVE + WAR FUND

At last we are able to give a definite report on the War Fund Drive that was started on March 1, 1943. Several times we were just ready to issue a statement as to the amount collected, etc., when some community would send in a sizable collection, or some individual would call at the office and leave some funds to be applied on this drive, but now the final tabulation has been made and we are delighted to report that the total amount collected is \$14,849.34; of this amount \$7,573.16 has been forwarded to the area office, San Francisco, to be transmitted to national headquarters, and \$7,276.18 has been retained by the local chapter. The executive board, in monthly session Monday evening, August 9, expressed appreciation of assistance given by the various community chairmen; their combined efforts made the drive the most successful ever conducted by this chapter.

Spreading of First Aid. From the area office in San Francisco we have just received word that Oregon ranks second in the number of people taking First Aid in the Pacific area, which comprises six states and Alaska. The letter is closed by this pertinent paragraph: "You'll be fairly safe in Oregon's swimming holes" for, even though these handsome life guards are now in the army, if you weren't one of the 2,365 residents who learned swimming in a Red Cross class last year, probably one of the 776 Oregonians trained in life saving will be glad to rescue you." Instruction in First Aid, under competent instructors, is available most all the time; full details may be obtained by any one interested, at the office of the Red Cross, room 411 Perkins building.

The ladies in the production department (sewing room) are most grateful to Mr. Ira Pollard. Why? Well, everyone of the 3,000 Ditty Bags that are being turned out have to have two tapes inserted in the top for drawstrings; sometimes this is hard to do. Mr. Pollard very ingeniously conceived the idea of smoothing off a stick about 14 inches in length, and cutting a slot in one end wide enough to hold the tape; this smooth stick can be slid through the place at the top of the bag intended for the tape, carrying the tape with it, quicker than you can tell it. Simple, yes, and very efficient!
