ON the fourth anniversary of Goering's boast that "not a single enemy bomb" would ever fall on Germany, the British drop 1500 tons of bombs on Nuernberg...

As to Goering's boast, the British announce with a touch of biting satire that since the war began they've dropped 136,100 TONS of bombs on Germany.

SWISS reports indicate that German reinforcements going to northern Italy have been passing through Nuernberg, giving us a clue as to why it was chosen for Tuesday night's pasting.

BRITISH warships bombard Italian shipping in the bay of Naples, moving in close to their targets at night and showering shells on them.

AS long as the Italian fleet remains "in being," as the navy writers call it, we'll have to keep heavy naval forces in the Mediterranean to offset it.

THE Russians are still booming westward and are reported to have Kharkov encircled on three sides.

What we're interested in is whether they have the strength this time to push the Germans clear out of Russia—as the British (with help from us) finally pushed them out of Africa after years of see-saw fighting.

GIVE THEM UNIFORMS

EDITORIAL

THE War Manpower Commission and selective service board are proclaiming to the public that fathers must be drafted to fill quotas fixed by the army and navy.

We refer to the huge number of men on the federal emergency and bureaucratic payroll.

In March of this year there were 3,034,000 federal civilian employees with a monthly payroll of \$561,475,000.

The federal civilian payroll in March, according to figures compiled by the Citizens National Committee, and reported by the joint congressional committee, headed by Senator Harry Byrd of Virginia, was 50 per cent greater than the payrolls of all the employees in all the 48 states, 3061 counties, 17,792 organized municipalities and 17,667 other local government units combined.

When it is realized that the taxpayers of this country are supporting ten million men in the armed services, three million in government bureaus and agencies, in addition to paying for the production of war material on a cost-plus basis, it may readily be understood why President Roosevelt says Congress must find more taxes for next year.

Certainly if the state of Oregon can conduct its business with seven thousand employees, the federal government does not need three times that number in this state.

With bureaus overlapping, issuing contradictory rules, orders and regulations, duplicating one another and performing many petty and trivial tasks, it would seem only reasonable that, if there is such a serious shortage of manpower in this country that fathers must be called to arms, the federal government should first do something about cleaning up a lot of parasites, putting them into uniforms or into some sort of productive enterprise.
