Red-Bearded Pilot is Flying Mail Man for Solomon Island Forces

GUADALCANAL — (AP) — A slim young fellow with a bright red beard is the flying mailman of the Solomon Islands.

He is Harry Thorington, 21, an enlisted aviation pilot, who hails from Grand Coulee, Wash., and is known hereabout as "Dilbert."

Thorington, one of the most popular men in the forward areas, where mail is miraculous medicine, started out in a humble way several months ago with an old Wildcat fighter plane he begged from the marines.

Since then he has graduated to a new TBF torpedo-bomber and he flies the mail, maps and messages regularly from Guadalcanal to our most advanced airfields.

"Dilbert" — that name comes from the cartoon the navy publishes to point out pilot errors — is rated one of the best pilots in this area. He never has had a fight with the enemy on his mail runs.

"I've been spotted once or twice, but I've always eased out," he laughed.

"A lieutenant here put me onto this job," Thorington said. "I didn't have a plane at the time so I bummed the P-4F from the marines. It had been stripped down and equipped as a photographic plane."

He offered his services as a flying courier to the strike command.

"They took me up right away," he continued, "especially when I told them I had my own plane."

"Dilbert" has carried a variety

of freight, including 2,000 pounds of sugar he once ferried from Guadalcanal to a nearby island. In addition to his regular cargo of mail sacks he carries cigarettes, candy, plane parts, medicine, and an occasional passenger.

Thorington, whose wife and folks live in Grand Coulee, joined the navy three years ago in Spokane. He later qualified for flight training, graduated from Pensacola, and joined a patrol squadron at Kaneohe naval air base, Hawaii. He was transferred to Canton Island, and then there was an assignment to a carrier aircraft service unit which was ordered to Guadalcanal.

Thorington no longer operates on a shoe-string. He is a recognized figure in Guadalcanal operations. He has an office, a flight crew, a gunner, and his new Avenger torpedo-bomber.

"I'm sitting pretty now," he says.
