Civilian Defense Heads Will Meet Here Thursday

Heads of all civilian defense units, together with their seconds in command, were requested today by Richard Maddox, commander, to be in attendance at a meeting to be held at 8 p. m. Thursday at the chamber of commerce office.

The meeting of department heads and their chief aides will be preliminary to the regular incident test to be held Friday night. The incident practice Friday, Maddox said, will start at 8 p. m. and will be concluded by 9 o'clock. There will be no test of the alarm system.

"Our previous tests," Maddox reports, "have shown a lack of coordination between departments and particularly a weakness in the dispatching system. The meeting Thursday night will be for the purpose of outlining the dispatching plan and bringing about a more thorough understanding of the methods to be used. It is very important that the head of each unit and his next in command be in attendance."

Foreign Assets Held in U. S. Must Be Reported

All persons owning stocks, bonds, property, accounts, notes, mortgages or other assets in foreign countries must file a listing of such assets prior to Nov. 1, E. S. McClain, manager of the Roseburg branch of the U. S. National bank, reported today. Local banks, he stated, can furnish the report forms.

The listings are required as a part of a census on foreign assets being compiled by the treasury department.

The report must include the assets held in South American countries, Canada and the Philippines, as well as all other foreign governments.

Ration Book No. 4 Being Printed

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Nationwide registration for war ration book No. 4 will take place between October 20 and November 1, Edward F. Stegen, regional rationing executive, announced today.

Ration book No. 4 will be used to replace war book No. 3, but will be used briefly in conjunction with it.

The method by which the registration will be handled cannot be disclosed at this time, Stegen said.

The new No. 3 book will become effective on Sept. 12. Because it has only 4 pages of point value stamps, and no stamps equivalent to the blue stamps in book No. 2, its use will have to begin as soon as possible, Stegen said.

War book No. 3 carries point value stamps equivalent to the red stamps of book No. 3 and unit stamps like the stamps in book No. 1. Its brown stamps will be used in purchasing meats, fats, oils and dairy products.

War book No. 4 is in print, but a description of its composition has not yet been made public beyond the statement that it contains stamps of both point and unit values.
