Japanese in U. S. Army Arrested in Banned Area Visit

TACOMA, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Chief of Police Wynn of Sumner announced that last Wednesday he had taken into custody Pvt. Hagima Okura, 26, a Japanese and a former resident of Algonia, Wash., who now is a U. S. soldier.

It was the second instance this summer in which Japanese-American soldiers have been apprehended in the Puyallup valley without army permission.

The valley is in the western Washington area from which all Japanese have been barred.

Okura, Wynn related, was held until FBI checked his identity and authorized his release provided he immediately left the western defense area.

"He had leave from Fort Robertson, Ark., to visit his folks who are interned at Caldwell, Idaho, but he had nothing to show any permission to visit here," the police chief said. He added that Okura said he came to Washington to look after his brother's property, which is being converted to a military depot.

Last month Wynn arrested three Japanese, former residents of the valley, who returned to recover a buried camera while on furlough. Wynn held all three until they were ordered released by military officials, he said.

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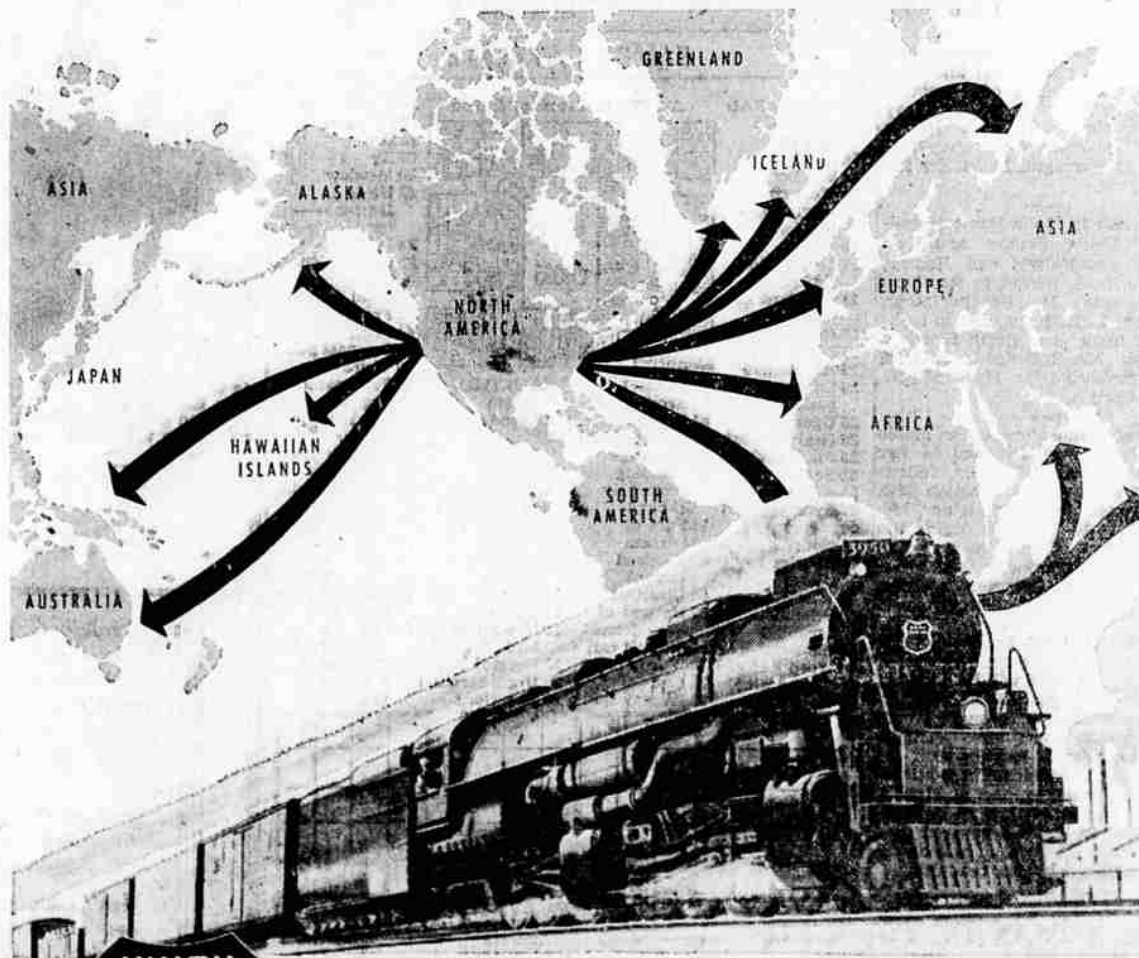
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
