## Three Convicts Face Charges as Sequel to Break

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 19.—(AP)—Three convicts involved in escape attempts from the state prison pleaded innocent in circuit court today to assault and robbery charges in connection with the attempts.

Merlyn Gene Kensler and Doyle C. McCann, who escaped last May from gun guards and who were recaptured in the mountains east of here, pleaded innocent to four indictments charging them with assault and robbery while armed with dangerous weapons. The trials for the two men were set for September 15.

They are accused of stealing two automobiles, rifle and \$100. Albert Doolin, one of two prisoners who tried to kidnap Sgt. Warden, guard, and use him as a shield to escape, pleaded innocent to a charge of assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon. His trial also will be held Sept. 15. A prisoner involved in the same escape attempt was shot and killed while Warden was stabbed by the pair and seriously wounded.

## Federal Buying of Dry Beans, Edible Peas is Outlined

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The government is expected to announce soon a program under which it would in effect purchase the bulk of the 1943 crop of dry edible beans and peas and resell 40 per cent for civilian consumption at a loss of about 70 cents a hundred pounds. The other 60 per cent would be used for war purposes.

The combined production of beans and peas has been forecast at about 33,000,000 100-pound bags.

Such a program is necessary, officials of the War Food administration said, because prices promised growers under a price support program are, in the case of most classes of beans and peas, higher than the ceilings established by OPA.

Since no adjustments in ceilings are contemplated, WFA officials said, the program is being shaped up this way.

Country shippers would be authorized to buy beans and peas at grower support prices. These shippers already have been required to reserve 60 per cent of designated classes of beans and peas for government agencies, such as the army, navy, other military services, and the lend-lease administration. The designated classes make up between 85 and 90 per cent of the crop.

The OPA would give the government procurement agencies authority to pay country shippers the support prices rather than the lower ceiling prices, for the reserved products.

The unreserved portion would be available for sale in civilian distribution channels at the ceilings. Such sales would involve losses to the country shippers of from 15 cents to \$1.00 a bag, depending on class. Officials said the losses would average about 70 cents.

The Commodity Credit Corporation then would reimburse the shipper for these losses.

Thus, country shippers would, in effect, be acting as agents for the government in handling both government and civilian supplies.

In determining the grower prices, the shipper would deduct certain cleaning and handling charges from the support price to give him his operational margin.

## Nazi Soldiers Ignorant Of Allied Triumphs

SPOKANE, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The German army, even its officers, has been kept so ignorant of the facts of the war "that many of them thought that although the allies had captured Tunisia, the axis still held Casablanca and Oran," Lieut. Gordon Coe has written from North Africa to friends here.

Germans, he wrote, thought that allied bombers had inflicted little damage on their home land; most of them believed that Germany still would win the war, and some even believed that axis planes had raided America.

## Axis Prisoners Aid in Battling Forest Fire

SPOKANE, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Interned German and Italian seamen have been helping fight a fire in the Nez Perce forest some 35 miles southeast of Grangeville, Idaho, Bert Frazier, officer in charge of the Fort Missoula, Mont., internment camp, revealed last night.

The men had volunteered for the work and had "shown up very well," he said.

T. A. Lowary, fire dispatcher for the Nez Perce forest, reported meanwhile that a crew of 300 men was "mopping up" after the blaze had been brought under control Tuesday night. The fire was set by lightning and burned 1,600 acres of range land in which there was some white pine timber.

Mr. Paulsen was a member of the Lutheran church and of the Modern Woodmen of America.

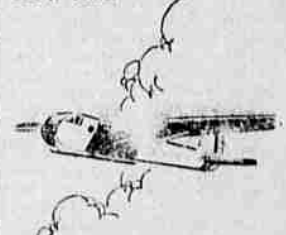
