

Circus Reserves Seat Section for War Bond Buyers

Cole Bros. circus, coming to Roseburg Thursday, Sept. 9, has arranged a donation of one entire section of the best reserved seats in the Big Top for purchasers of war bonds. It was announced here today by Howard S. Moss, special representative of the circus.

The Douglas County War Savings staff is being given a block of 384 tickets to be distributed in accordance with a plan which will represent sales of \$50,000. The seating space is donated without reservations to the War bond campaign, Moss states, and the county will receive full credit for the amount of bonds sold.

There will be 144 seats for purchasers of \$25 bonds, 96 seats for purchasers of \$50 bonds, 96 seats for buyers of \$100 bonds, 32 seats for persons buying bonds in denominations of \$500 and 16 seats, the best ten affords, for buyers of \$1,000 bonds. Aside from the investment of money in war bonds, the buyer sees the circus free of charge, except for the federal tax of 17 cents per ticket.

The tickets are to be placed on sale in the near future.

"The buyers of the war bonds will sit in a section reserved exclusively in their honor, and all of the principal acts will be placed to that section," Moss stated.

The seats donated to the war bond campaign have been a complete sell-out in practically every locality visited so far this year, Moss said. They represent a donation of \$645 per day by the circus, as they would return that amount of money if regularly sold. He added that capacity crowds are greeting the circus at each stop and the seats could easily be sold if not reserved for the special cause. It is estimated that the bond sales promoted by the circus during the 1943 season will amount to \$10,000, Moss said.

Defense Councils Advised on Driving During Blackouts

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 18—(AP)—State Defense Administrator Jerrold Owen advised county defense councils yesterday where should be given permits to drive automobiles and other vehicles during blackouts.

Permits should be given to personnel of defense control centers, a few district air raid wardens, a few messengers, rescue personnel, medical personnel, a few emergency drivers, a few emergency welfare supervisors, key utility repair experts, gas officers, bomb reconnaissance officers, and incident officers.

Permits should not be given to auxiliary police, auxiliary firemen, fire guards, demolition and clearance units, road repair men, and decontamination units, since these units either operate on foot or do their work after raids.

Owen announced that service ribbons now are available for civilian defense workers credited with 500 or more hours in service. Other awards will be given for 1000 and 2000 hours.

Vandenberg Asks 2-Way Policy on Politics Taboo

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18—Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) yesterday agreed with War Mobilization Director Byrnes that the less political discussion until next fall the better, but declared "It's a poor rule that doesn't work both ways."

Byrnes said in an address: "In the fall of 1944 there will be a national election. Then there must be political discussion. Until then the less the better. The people of America are not concerned about party advantage or personal ambition."

Asserting that "Mr. Byrnes is substantially right," Vandenberg commented:

"But instead of lecturing the rest of us, I suggest he start his crusade by getting Henry Wallace on the ball and telling him to pipe down on his program of disunity speeches."

"Then he might remind Joe Guffey that the president doesn't want to hear any more about the fourth term crusade until the fall of 1944. Then he might demobilize the palace guard. It's a poor rule that doesn't work both ways."
