Enlistment in WAVES Eased in U. S. Navy's Need

New requirements that make it easier for women to enlist in the WAVES and an increased number of jobs that they can take over should be an incentive for more young women between the ages of 20 and 36 to enlist says Chief Specialist W. E. Bell of the local navy recruiting station.

The reduction of physical qualifications, now make it a very simple procedure to enlist in the WAVES. Any young woman who has had two years of high school and is physically fit and able to work is invited to visit the navy recruiting station Saturday, Aug. 21, and make application for enlistment in the WAVES. Chief Bell will be at the local navy recruiting station in the Chamber of Commerce office from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. Saturday and from 12:30 to 3 p. m. Sunday for the convenience of those who cannot appear Saturday.

Information has been received that a large number of young women are needed for the hospital corps in the navy.

Voluntary enlistments for 17-year-old young men and those from 38 to 50 years are still open and Chief Bell asks any who are interested to see him when he is in Roseburg this weekend. Young men in the navy who have any aptitude along any mechanical line will have an opportunity to qualify for one of the navy trade schools.

Chief Bell emphasizes the fact that any men between 18 and 38 who has not yet received his in-

duction papers and who has a trade of any kind that can be used in the construction battalion can get into that branch of the navy.

Mrs. E. Pemberton Dies Following Leg Fracture

Injuries suffered July 16 when a fall resulted in a fractured leg, proved fatal for Mrs. Elizabeth M. Pemberton, 71, who died last night at Mercy hospital, where she had been confined since her accident.

Born Nov. 6, 1871, at Huntington, W. Va., she was married to William Pemberton, Aug. 6, 1889. They came to Roseburg in 1911. Mr. Pemberton died here in 1934. Surviving are three sons, Jasper Pemberton, Rock Island, Ill., and William and Edward Pemberton, Roseburg.
