Livestock Projects Of 4-H Club to be Scored This Week

The chief activity in 4-H club work this week will be that of the scoring of livestock projects. This program will be completed by the end of the week.

This is a part of the Roseburg Lions club project for the season. The first section, that of victory gardens, has been completed. The second and third sections, livestock and poultry, are now being conducted and the fourth section, canning, will be completed early in September. The Lions club has \$700 in special premiums to award to the outstanding members; \$150 of this is earmarked for victory gardeners, \$450 for livestock and poultry and \$100 for canning.

According to County Club Agent E. A. Britton, scoring will be done today at Edenhower, Wilbur and Garden Valley and this evening at Lookingglass and Green. Tomorrow the scorers will go to Drain, Yoncalla, Scotts Valley and Oakland. On Wednesday projects at Winston, Green, Brockway, Glengary and Melrose will be scored. Thursday, the scoring will be done at Glendale, Days Creek and Myrtle Creek. On Friday those projects at Glide, Idleyd and on the Buckhorn road will be scored. Each project is scored on gen-

eral appearance, feeding practices, care and training, apparent interest in and knowledge of the project, the members showmanship ability and the record book.

Rationing Rules On Rubber Boots Relaxed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23—(AP)—Rationing regulations on certain types of rubber boots and footwear were relaxed Saturday by the OPA, due to increased allotments of the product by the War Production board.

Under the new rules employers can obtain rubber footwear for their employees, and consumers desiring below-the-knee rubber boots are eligible for ration certificates needed to obtain them. Also, assorted types of rubber boots and shoes needed by farmers are released from rationing, provided the dealer involved files an inventory of such stock with his OPA office.
