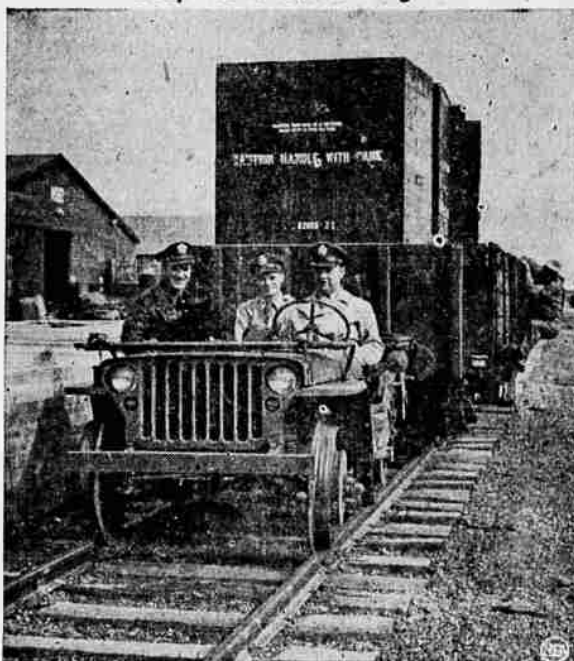

## Jap Maps Found In Tacoma House

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 24—(AP)—The presence of Japanese maps in a house, formerly occupied by a Japanese, where workmen yesterday found a Japanese inscribed map of the Pacific area pasted on a wall, was reported to the FBI in Dec., 1941, detective Roy S. Morrison of Tacoma police said today.

The house was visited by two Tacoma police officers Dec. 24, 1941, in a census of Japanese in Tacoma being made at that time, Morrison said.

"I understand that the FBI picked up maps from the house at that time, but this map (which the workmen found) was pasted on a partition and perhaps was not seen then—I don't know," Morrison said today.

The Tacoma News-Tribune yesterday said that the map was identical to a copy of one in the possession of Kikuo K. Haan, Korean nationalist agent, and that Haan claims his map reveals Japanese invasion plans of Alaska, Hawaii and the United States.

## Hitler May Have Seen "Handwriting in Sky"

LONDON, Aug. 24—(AP)—The possibility that Adolf Hitler may have seen personally some "handwriting in the sky" after the Flying Fortress' England-to-Africa shuttle raid on Regensburg Aug. 18 was raised today by Capt. Walter E. Flagg, 25, Sanville, Calif., pilot of the Fortress "Wabbit Two." Flagg reported that after the bombing run against the Messerschmitt factory at Regensburg, his wing reassembled only a few miles from Hitler's mountain retreat at Berchtesgaden.

"If Schickelgruber was here he certainly saw plenty of exhaust trails across the Bavarian skies and he also saw a column of smoke 20,000 feet high over Regensburg. We could see it 150 miles away."

## Additional Men Needed for Crew At Local Cannery

The Paulus Bros. cannery in Roseburg, now in operation, is in need of from 10 to 12 more men for its crew, Claude Martin, manager, reported today. The cannery would particularly welcome business men willing to work the short swing shift at night, Martin said. Enough women already have been employed to make up the two shifts, and only a few men are needed for the full day-time shift. However, the swing shift crew still is short of manpower.

In numerous localities business men, clerks, and other men otherwise occupied during daytimes are doing cannery work at night and are finding the work not only profitable but a form of relaxation from desk or counter work, Martin reports.

Any men desiring night work at the cannery are invited to contact the manager either in person or by telephone without delay.

The cannery made its test run Saturday. Several adjustments were made Sunday, and a full shift was worked Monday. Although all employees, with the exception of a few key workers brought from the Salem plant, were inexperienced and had to be given complete instructions. The plant was operating smoothly and made a very creditable output for Monday's run, Martin said. It is expected the plant will be working at full capacity by the end of the week.

Beans are now being canned and this pack will continue for from three to four weeks and will be followed immediately by the tomato pack and later by prunes.

## Mystery Killing at Salem Being Probed

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 24—(AP)—Police attempted today to solve the death of Stephen Jay Billings, 33, shipyard worker, who died late yesterday from a blow on the back of his head.

His body was found on the porch at the home of his mother, Mrs. Ethel C. Billings, who was believed to be at Newport.

Billings was divorced from his wife. Police said Billings was recovering from a severe pneumonia attack. The porch was disordered, a case of empty beer bottles

having been upset. Some money and a ring were found on the porch.
