guesses—for the losses we can afford or can't afford are strict military secrets.

BUT if we CAN go ahead systematically destroying one great German city after another, the end is only a question of time. No nation in the world could stand up long under such a program of destruction.

FROM the standpoint of news that makes headlines, the Churchill-FDR conference at Quebec was highly unsatisfactory. But, for that very reason, it is impressive. Because they said so little, we got the idea that they are prepared to DO MUCH.

Too much talking is so often followed by too little action.

WATCH these disturbances in Denmark. They're significant. A year ago, they'd have been put down bloodily by the Germans. They may be yet.

But the delay in handling them tells its own story. Nazi Germany is nowhere near as confident as she was.

AND don't take your eye off the Mediterranean. Reports from Algiers and Gibraltar indicate that we're steadily building up our strength there. We had a lot of strength to begin with. A second front through the Balkans would relieve the Russians as DIRECTLY as a second land front through France or Belgium.

And the fighting weather in the Balkans will last much longer than the fighting weather in Western Europe.

OF one thing we may be sure. We're following a GENERAL PLAN—not just barging ahead blindly from day to day. This plan is better understood by the German high command than by us guessers here at home.

There are no discernible signs of cockiness on the part of the Nazi high command. On the contrary, the job that has just been given to Gestapo Himmler is a distinct sign of uneasiness.

Oleo Use Denied State's Patients By Control Board

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 25—(AP)—The state board of control declined today to grant a request by Dr. J. C. Evans, state hospital superintendent, for permission to feed oleomargarine to hospital patients in order to give them more fats.

The hospital uses 540 pounds of butter a week for its 2700 patients. Dr. Evans, asserting the patients' diet is woefully deficient in fats, asked for permission to use 270 pounds of butter plus 600 pounds of oleomargarine, advising the board that oleomargarine is equal to butter. The additional fats would not cost anything because butter costs about twice as much as oleomargarine.

The board put the proposal back in Dr. Evans' lap, meaning that no change will be made because a 1943 law permits use of butter substitutes only with the board's approval.

State Treasurer Scott objected to saving butter because he fears the saved butter would be shipped to Russia.

"I have information that the Russians are using our butter to grease their boots. The Russians don't know how to use butter, and margarine would make just as good boot grease."

Secretary of State Farrell, calling oleomargarine "Filipino butter," suggested that Dr. Evans be allowed to buy much more butter, even though it would

THE WORLD OF TOMORROW
EDITORIAL

POST-WAR planning is of much greater importance than most individuals realize, according to Jim Mess, president of the Umpqua Valley Chamber of Commerce. Mess attended the conference recently held in Portland by the National Association of Manufacturers and Columbia Industries, Inc., holding the record for the longest distance travelled to join in the meeting.

"We hear a great deal about post-war planning on a national and international scale," Mess said, "but we must not overlook the community angle. There are going to be a great many changes in our own county after the war and we shouldn't waste any time in getting ready for them. The Pacific coast will show a great increase in population. Transportation demands will require vast highway development. Many new industries will be created. Every community will be affected."

Mess was also intrigued by the display of new products that will be included with consumer goods in the post-war period. He saw a new device, now in use on airplanes, which eliminates danger of injury from tire blowouts. Tiny balls, made of a new plastic, fill pneumatic tubes, preventing them from collapsing when ruptured. They already have saved many lives through prevention of accident in landing warplanes on which tires have been riddled by ack-ack fire.

Those attending the meeting saw neckties made of wood and glass, which could not be distinguished from ordinary neckties; fabrics made of fiberglass, offering increased decorative qualities; flexible, non-corrosive plastic, and glass water pipes, which will reduce installation cost and eliminate replacements.

Prediction was made that shoes of the future will have flexible wooden soles, as good progress is now being made on a plan of making wood as flexible as leather. The meeting was told that synthetic tires, following the war, will be improved to the point where they may be expected to give 100,000 miles of service.

Dr. Gustav Egloff, president of the American Institute of Chemists, who held the conference spellbound with his story of things to come, told of homes to be built of light metals and prefabricated woods; automobiles of light weight and increased horsepower and numerous other achievements of science, chemistry and production which will build a new peace-time world of better living.

Mr. Mess has in mind the need for serious study now to meet the changing industrial, economic and social picture after the war. No one can say with accuracy how soon the predicted wonderland now being foretold will come into actual existence. It probably will not be as early as many anticipate, as industry, busy with the problem of conversion back to peace-time operations, will, for a time at least, doubtless return to the old products.

But eventually there will be some vast and startling changes in our plan of life. We will need more and better highways. We will need space for new homes. We will need adequate services and utilities. These are things for which we can begin preparing.

Truck Operators Told What to Do In Tire Problem

Eligible truck operators, who hold tire rationing certificates but who are unable to locate within their county the proper tires, may apply to their nearest motor transport district office of the office of defense transportation for assistance, announced Jim H. Busch, O. D. T. manager for the Medford district office.

This information will in turn be transmitted daily to the office of rubber director, who will endeavor to arrange for the proper redistribution of tires so that all certificates can be honored as quickly as possible after issuance.

This procedure was decided upon, the O. D. T. stated, after some truck operators reported they were unable to obtain critically needed tires and as a result had to keep vehicles out of operation. In some cases it was reported that important war freight was delayed for this reason.

It is hoped that the new arrangement will help essential operators to obtain prompt relief, Busch stated.
