Germans Yield Tanager To Russian Juggernaut

by the retreating Germans in the Tanager area.

Tanager, a city with a normal population of 70,000, had been in German hands since the early summer of 1942.

The soviet communique today indicated that fast-moving soviet columns south and west of Khar'kov are threatening 800,000 nazis troops in the Donets basin, so-called, with possible encirclement. Russian troops advanced 3 to 7 miles to recapture 50 villages, including the railroad junction of Lyubotin, 25 miles west of Khar'kov on the Kurk-Kiev line, the war bulletin announced.

The push seemed to be aimed at by-passing the big nazis base at Poltava, 85 miles to the south and west of Khar'kov, on the north. At the same time another soviet spearhead farther south was pointing in the direction of Krasnodar, in a drive apparently aimed at pinching off the base just as the nazis began to retreat.

Action on the Khar'kov and Voroshilovgrad fronts seemed to be rapidly blending into one gigantic drive by which the Russians hoped to reach the sweeping eastward bend of the Dnieper river somewhere in the vicinity of Dniepropetrovsk, thus imperiling the whole nazis position in the Donets basin. Russian airmen ranging far and wide over German-held territory to bomb and snare troop concentrations and supply depots reported the Germans were destroying their own military installations in evident preparation for further withdrawals toward the west.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Speculation on the possibility of an early Anglo-Russian-American conference was given a new boost today when it was learned that Foreign Secretary Eden will meet both Ivan Maisky, former Russian ambassador to Great Britain, and U. S. Ambassador Winant tomorrow.

Many diplomatic observers are convinced that Eden, Maisky and Winant will consider the possibilities of joint, personal, three-power conversations, at least on the "foreign minister level."

It was announced yesterday that Eden had returned to England from the Quebec war councils and at the same time it was reported that Maisky, replaced in Britain as ambassador only recently, had returned.

freight yards at La Mezla. Invaders also scored a direct hit on a temporary bridge over the Angitola river.

The Marauders rained bombs on a large concentration of box-cars in the Torre Annunziata freight yards south of Vesuvius, causing a large explosion and many fires.

The most determined enemy opposition of the day was encountered by the Marauders when about 50 enemy fighters attacked them.

The Fortresses, which employed their customary high-level precision bombing tactics at Orte, had scant trouble with enemy fighters.

to invade the royal barracks and naval yard in Copenhagen as the scuttling of warships was in progress, Danes who escaped to Sweden reported.

Forty-five vessels of various types, including two new destroyers and nine submarines, were sunk, ammunition dumps blown up, and harbor fortifications wrecked.

Nazi troops surrounded the royal palace at Amalienborg, but the royal guard blocked all entrances and exchanged a barrage of gunfire with the Germans. Resistance ceased only when King Christian X gave the order.

Rent Control Invalid, Georgia Jurist Rules

MACON, Ga., Aug. 30.—(AP)—United States District Judge Deaver today ruled "invalid and unconstitutional" the rent control section of the emergency price control act of 1942.

The jurist held that congress had delegated too much power to the rent control agency for setting prices. This resulted in rule by regulation of a government agency instead of by law, making the rent control section unconstitutional, Deavers held.

Score Over Germany Favors U. S. Air Force

LONDON, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The U. S. Eighth air force knocked down a record 307 enemy fighters in the two-day assault on Regensburg and Schweinfurt, Germany, on Aug. 17, but suffered a loss of 59 Flying Fortresses, a new high for American operations in this theater, according to headquarters compilations.

The Bulgarian public appears to fear that the nation now will quickly fall completely into the hands of the Germans. While there have been no signs of serious disturbances, the conferences between Gabrovsky and the gestapo chief apparently indicate the government's fears.
