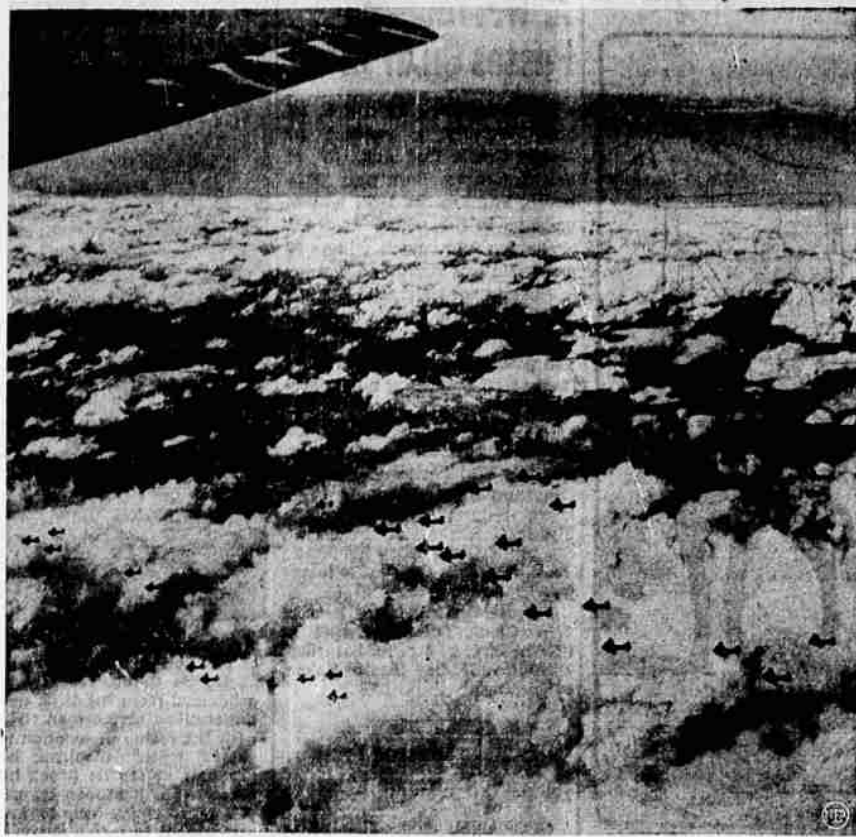
Ration Dates and Data

RATION BOOK NO. 2
OCTOBER 2—Expiration date of red stamps, X, Y and Z, last of the red stamps series in War Ration Book 2. X becomes valid August 22; Y on August 29, and Z on September 5.
SEPTEMBER 20—Expiration date of blue stamps R, S and T (processed foods). Blue stamps U, V and W become valid September 1, good through October 20.

RATION BOOK NO. 3
(Brown Stamps)
Replacement book containing coupons to be used as those in ration book 2 run out.
OCTOBER 2—Expiration date of brown stamps A and B.
OCTOBER 30—Expiration date of brown stamps C, D, E and F. A becomes valid September 12; B on September 19; C on September 26; D on October 3; E on October 26; F on October 30. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

RATION BOOK NO. 1
SUGAR
OCTOBER 31—Expiration date stamp No. 14, five pounds. Canning sugar stamps No. 15 and 16, each good for 5 pounds, through October 31.
SHOES—OCTOBER 31—Stamp No. 18, good for one pair of shoes through this date.
TIRES
Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months; B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. September 30 next inspection deadline for A book holders.
FUEL OIL
SEPTEMBER 30—Period 5 coupons valid March 26 through September 30. Heating coupons—

PRICE, Utah—Choice steaks—and no red ration stamps.

MINNEAPOLIS—Just because your bull is sick you can't get extra gasoline rations to go and sit with him, the consolidated ration board here decided.

Hull Raps Pearson For Assertion on Soviet Relation

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30—(AP)—Secretary Hull today termed "monstrous and diabolical falsehoods" charges he said had been made by Drew Pearson, columnist and radio commentator, that Hull and other high state department officials wished the soviet union "to be bled white."

The secretary of state issued the following statement:

"I do not ordinarily take notice of attacks made either on the state department or myself. When these attacks, however, concern our relations with an allied government, I must take notice of them.

"I am informed that recently Drew Pearson published over the radio and in the press the charge that I and other high officials in the state department are opposed to the soviet government, and that we actually wish the soviet union to be bled white.

"I desire to brand these statements as monstrous and diabolical falsehoods."

Last week Hull said in a statement which did not name individuals that some writers and commentators were lending aid and comfort to the enemy "by making untrue statements about international relations of the United States."

Pearson, commenting on the secretary's statement, said:

"I hope that Mr. Hull's denial of my charge that he is anti-Russian will stand up better than his recent denial that Sumner Welles would resign."
