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Serial Numbers To be Put on Gas Ration Stamps

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1—(AP)—The OPA intends to put serial numbers on gasoline ration stamps to trap bootleggers of stolen coupons.

The new system, an OPA official said today, probably will be set up early next year. Meanwhile, central issuance stations will be established in major cities to speed delivery of extra rations to essential drivers.

The changes are part of a campaign for stricter policing of gasoline use to cut off black market operators by keeping closer tab on issued ration tickets. The coupons will be issued in strips bearing serial numbers, making them easier to trace.

Ration boards will keep records of the ticket numbers issued to each motorist. Whenever tickets are lost or stolen ration boards will give the numbers to filling stations in the area, so they can be on the alert for any attempt to cash the cancelled stamps.

Present gasoline coupons bear no identifying number and books are "tailored" to a motorist's allowance by removing excess stamps. An OPA official said many of these stamps were getting into circulation through stamp bootleggers who peddled them to motorists.

Ban Off Light Shields in Areas Away From Coast

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 1—(AP)—The ninth regional civilian defense board announced today granting of a blanket variation to permit removal of all traffic light shields in areas which are not visible from the sea.

State Civilian Defense Administrator Owen said the action was taken to eliminate traffic hazards, and done in the belief that traffic lights are in the category of protective lighting.

Owen said that engineers representing the board have studied traffic signals and recommended the variation as a means of eliminating accidents which constitute a serious impairment to war production.

Traffic lights now are shielded in many interior cities along the coast. They originally were shielded so they could continue operation during blackouts. The shields have a thin slit in them so that only a small part of the signal is visible.

Child Attacker Slain In Attempted Escape

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 1—(AP)—A police detective today shot and killed the confessed rapist who had been twice wounded yesterday at the police show-up here by a coast guard lieutenant commander whose little daughter had pointed him out with cries of "that's the man."

The dead man is William Stevens, 36, who confessed, police said, to at least five assaults upon young girls enticed to his car with promise of a ride and candy and then threatened with a knife. He was trying to escape, the detective reported.
