CHECKS IN A BOOM TOWN

EDITORIAL

PROOF that Douglas county has reached the boom stage is evidenced, "Believe It Or Not," in the increasing number of worthless and forged checks being passed on business houses, State Police Sergeant Paul Morgan reports. Bad check artists, he states, always flock to boom towns. Their operations are greatly simplified by the presence of hundreds of new residents and new industries. Merchants, anxious to build good will among potential customers, endeavor to be accommodating. Thus they become easy prey for the unscrupulous "paper hanger."

A check artist may work for a few weeks at an industrial plant, establishing identity and credit before issuing a flock of worthless or forged checks and then moving on to another community.

One man, for instance, recently did just that, forging his employer's name to checks written on a bank in which the employer had never had an account.

Business men must utilize extreme care in ascertaining the identity of persons submitting checks, the officers state. "Any honest man," says District Attorney J. V. Long, "will be willing to help to prove his identity."

Warning was given, however, that a social security card is not good identification. One suspect recently taken into custody had seven social security cards on his person.

A selective service registration card or an Oregon automobile driver's permit are both acceptable for identification purposes as they carry a description. However, the description should be closely compared with the person presenting the check and, furthermore, a record should be made of the serial number of the driver's license or registration card.

Appearance should never be considered in cashing questionable checks, the officers warn, for check artists may wear the garb of a business or professional man or may appear in work clothes. Then, too, they always have a very plausible story to go with the cashing of the check.

Fully 90 per cent of worthless checks are presented after banking hours, with the majority coming on Saturday, thus giving the culprit ample time to escape before the check is cleared through the bank.

The responsibility for accepting worthless checks must be borne by the business man. District Attorney Long states. Occasionally it is possible to apprehend check artists but usually they manage to escape across state borders, and extradition is too costly to permit return of the criminals except in flagrant cases. The time and expense involved in making prolonged investigation also adds much cost to taxpayers and is not justified when diligence on the part of the merchant would prevent loss.

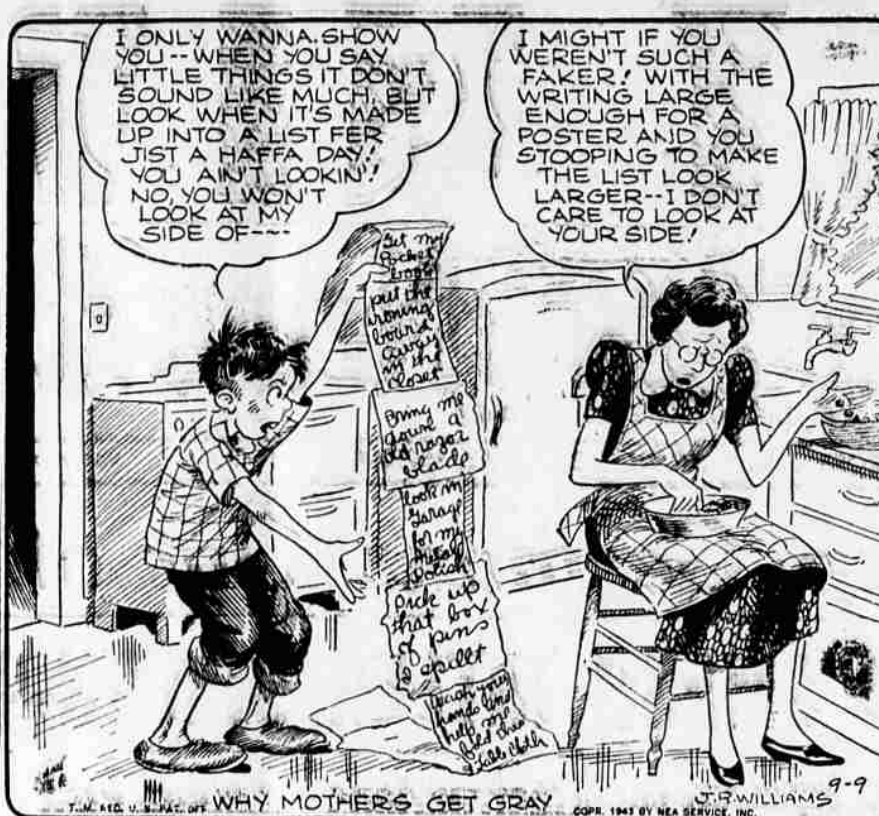

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

Miss Helen Lowry, 32, Portland librarian, fell to her death from the top of Cooper spur to Eliot glacier on Mount Hood Monday. Members of her climbing party notified forest service guides who recovered her body after a six-hour search.

Five soldiers from the Walla Walla air base died of injuries from the collision of their automobile with an army truck near Arlington. None were Oregon men.

Chester A. Strouse, 36, was killed by the discharge of a .22 caliber pistol he was removing from the glove compartment of his automobile at his home in Shelton. Police said the gun apparently slipped from his holster, firing when it hit the ground.

The death toll from accidents in Oregon over the triple holiday was increased to 11 by a belated report from Cottage Grove Tuesday. Kenneth P. Miller, 23, Portland, was killed late Monday when his automobile struck a roadside embankment and overturned west of Cottage Grove.

In Eugene's first traffic fatality of the year, Albert Pollock, 67, was killed in an automobile collision.

FOURTH CORPS HEADQUARTERS, CENTRAL OREGON MANEUVER AREA, Sept. 8.—Thousands of new troops swelled to 75,000 today the number of soldiers spreading over the central Oregon maneuver area for the start of vast war games Monday.

Major-General Alexander M. Patch, commander of American army troops on Guadalcanal, will direct combined operations of infantry, artillery, engineers, air and armored forces and supporting service units. The mock warfare will continue to November 7.

Cole Bros. Offer Roseburg Great Circus Tomorrow

The last word in tent show entertainment, incredible horses, wire walkers, jugglers, acrobats, equestrians, aerialists, trapeze artists, wild jungle animals, elephants and everything else that goes to make up a circus will descend upon Roseburg early tomorrow morning when the great Cole Brothers circus, one of the two largest in the world, arrives here.

The huge show, traveling on a mile-long train of double length steel railroad cars, will come to town loaded with new and startling features. The first section should arrive about tomorrow morning and be spotted at the Southern Pacific freight depot.

With three rings, stages and the gigantic big top so constructed as to allow much greater space for hippodrome and aerial displays than in past seasons, the big show's 1943 program far surpasses those of former years. Big acts and displays are in greater numbers than ever before and there are scores of featured horse acts. Roseburg audiences will see the noted Hanford troupe of bare-back riding marvels, with Poodles Hanford, greatest of all riding comedians; the world-renowned Antalecks, stars of the acrobatic field; Marilyn Rich, solo trapeze artist; Jean Allen, daring rider of rearing and high jumping horses and dozens upon dozens of other stars and displays that have made the 1943 program the greatest in Cole Brothers history.

Pageant Opens Show

The performance opens with a spectacle, "The Conquest of Coronado," in which hundreds of people and animals participate and features the voice of Florence Tennyson, prima donna of the Chicago Opera company. Altogether there are over 350 men and women stars, including 50 of the world's greatest and best known clowns.

For the convenience of circus patrons, a downtown ticket office will be in operation all day tomorrow at Roy Bellows' store, 213 Jackson street. Both general and reserved tickets will be on sale at the same price charged at the circus grounds. Shows will be at 3 p. m. and 8 p. m.
