War Supplies In Pacific Ample, Patterson Says

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson, in a month-long swing around the Pacific war zone, found allied commanders there sufficiently supplied at the moment with materials and manpower to sustain whatever campaigns may be undertaken.

"I saw no shortage of equipment," he said Saturday on his return from the western theater of war. "Everybody wants planes, but that is true of all fronts."

"We have clear air superiority both in the South and the Southwest Pacific, and it is of growing importance. Our reserves are adequate for all military operations there."

Patterson cautioned, however, against any relaxation in the war effort at home, such as he thought might be inspired by the surrender of Italy.

"The Germans and Japanese still are formidable fighters," he warned, "and have military machines of great striking power in the field. The army's need (for manpower) is as great as ever, and the need for military weapons continues unabated."

The Japanese specifically Patterson described as "very hard fighters," but he said "our troops are better and harder fighters and give the Japanese more than they can take."

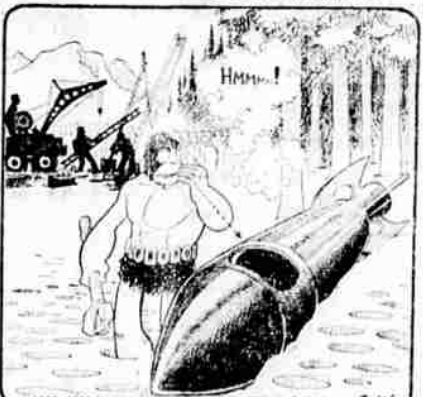
