Woman En Route Dies Suddenly in Roseburg

Mrs. Sam Davis, 25, of Arcata, Calif., died at Mercy hospital in Roseburg today following an emergency operation. Wild Turkeys Still Under Legal Protection

There is no open season on wild turkeys and it is unlawful at any time to shoot these birds, which are protected by state law. State Policeman Fred L. Perry of the game law enforcement division reported today. He stated that many hunters have been making inquiry since seeing large numbers of the turkeys on the white-tail deer reserve, which was opened this season to deer hunters. Several of the wild turkeys were released on the reserve about five years ago, Perry states, and they have multiplied rapidly. It is estimated that they now number 250 to 300.

Vacated Store Being Fitted for Bank's Use

J. H. Booth president of the Douglas National bank, who recently purchased the Parrott building from Umpqua post of the American Legion, has started remodeling of the quarters recently vacated by Ott's Music store. The quarters will be fitted up for use by the bank's book-keeping department, Mr. Booth reports.

The department has been expanded so rapidly that it is overcrowded for space and, as further additions soon will be necessary, more ample quarters are required, he said.

Plans are being made for a more extensive remodeling in the near future and the transfer of other banking departments into the newly acquired building.

Earlier Autonomy For Filipinos Asked by F. R.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—President Roosevelt asked congress today for authority to "proclaim the legal independence of the Philippines as a separate and self-governing nation as soon as feasible." July 4, 1946, is the date for independence now set by law and by votes of the Filipinos, but Mr. Roosevelt told congress in a special message it was possible that fortunes of war will permit an earlier consummation of this joint will of the American and Filipino peoples.

The Japanese have held the Philippines since early 1942 and have taken steps themselves which they say are intended to give the islands independence. More than 90 per cent of all goods shipped to the U. S. from Puerto Rico are farm products. A pair of soldier's shoes lasts about two weeks in some combat zones.

Have you had occasion, recently to call on a doctor? Well, if you have you probably waited and waited in the reception room, along with a score or more of others until it was almost necessary to call the undertaker before you were ushered into the presence of the M. D. All of which is to remind you that through the Red Cross you may receive knowledge from competent instructors by enrolling in one of the classes in home nursing that are being organized. The knowledge thus gained may be very useful to you when there is such a shortage of nurses and doctors, or when they are as busy as they are at the present time.

Each class is taught by a registered nurse; the registration fee is \$1 and the cost of the text book is 60 cents; the class work is twenty hours; class periods are two hours each; classes are held both afternoon and evening, thus giving those employed during the day an opportunity to avail themselves of the instruction. Further information may be obtained and reservations for classes may be made by calling the Red Cross office, 167-J, located on the fourth floor of the Perkins building.

Quite a bit of interest in First Aid instruction is being shown at the present time. Mrs. Lois Varney Baker, one of the many competent instructors, has just completed two classes in the Tenth-mile vicinity.
