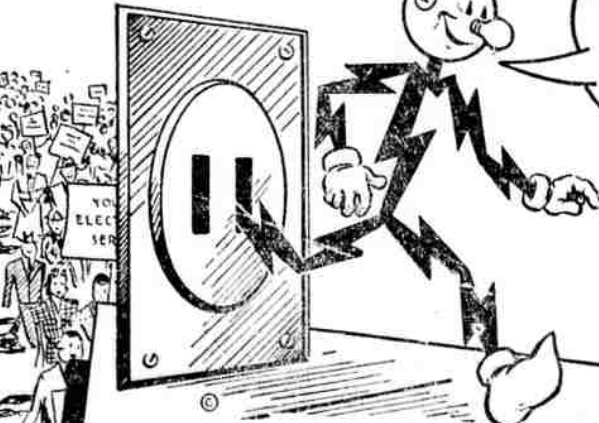

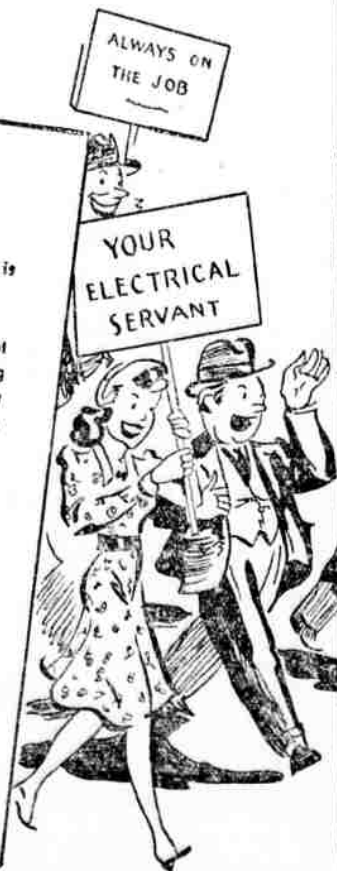
Glad to meet you again folks! Remember me? My name is REDDY KILOWATT.
