Butter Supply Increase Promised to Civilians

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Civilians hailed today the government announcement that their butter supply will take a sharp upturn soon.

The military and other government purchasing agencies have arranged to stay out of the butter market until next March, the War Food administration announced, to permit the available supply to go into civilian channels.

The WFS said the action should increase the civilian butter supply from 10 to 30 per cent. The ration point value, 16 points per pound, remains unchanged.

Shortages of butter have developed in many areas, particularly in regions distant from the major producing centers.

Sex Angle Probed In Murder of Aged Tacoma Woman

TACOMA, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Tacoma police were seeking today the slayer or slayers of Mrs. Nellie McDonald, 77, old age pensioner and fortune teller, whose battered body was found yesterday morning in a vacant lot near her modest home.

Detective P. O. Brown said no one else sought relatives of the woman, who had lived alone for years. These included an estranged husband, believed to be living in Seattle and a son, Carl, believed to be in Long Beach, Calif.

From the position in which the body was found, it was believed the elderly woman may have been the victim of attempted rape, Brown said, and several soldiers and sailors who were arrested under circumstances which made them remotely possible suspects in the case, were being questioned today. No one, however, was being held as a direct suspect.

Mrs. McDonald was apparently

slain as she was returning to her home shortly after 1 o'clock Sunday morning after having dined at a cafe. Her purse, containing \$28 and personal effects, was found about 15 feet from her body, and a handbag, containing groceries, was found about 12 feet away in another direction.

Nazi Warship Tirpitz Damaged by Midget Sub

LONDON, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The Nazi battleship Tirpitz has been damaged by British midget submarines, a communique announced today.

The daring attack was carried out on the main units of the German battleship in their protected anchorage in Alten Fjord in northern Norway, "involving hazards of the first order," the announcement said.

"Underwater damage" was inflicted on the Tirpitz, it added.
