Butter Supply Increase Promised to Civilians

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11. (AP)-Civilians hailed today the overnment announcement that their butter supply will take a shorp upturn soon.

The military and other government purchasing agencies have arranged to stay out of the butter market until next March, the War Food administration announced, to permit the available supply to go into civilian chan-nels.

The WFS said the action should increase the civilian butter sup-ply from 10 to 30 per cent. The
