ENJOY INEXPENSIVE PRIZE - WINNING Orange Marmalade

It's Easy To Make Anytime With This Simple Recipe

- 6 Medium Sized Oranges (2 lbs. Sliced)
- 6 Cups Water
- 1 Cup Lemon Juice (About 6 lemons)
- 1 Package M.C.P. Pectin
- 93 Level Cups Sugar (Measured ready for use)

1. Cut oranges in quarters with very sharp knife to make slices thin as possible. Discard the large flat peel ends. Sliced fruit should weigh 2 pounds.
2. Put sliced fruit in quart kettle. Add the water and lemon juice.
3. Bring to a quick boil; boil gently for 1 hour (uncovered). If peel is not tender in 1 hour, boil until tender.
4. Measure the cooked material. Due to boiling, the volume will be reduced below 7 cups. Add water to make total peel and juice exactly 7 cups.
5. Put back in kettle. Stir in M. C. P. Pectin, continue stirring and bring to a full boil.
6. Add sugar (previously measured). Stir gently until it has reached a full rolling boil, and BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, skim and stir by turns for 5 minutes.
7. Pour into jars. If you use pint or quart jars, seal hot and invert jars on lids until marmalade begins to set. Then shake well and seal jars upright. This keeps the peel evenly distributed throughout.

NOTE: This recipe works equally well with Navel Oranges or Valencia. When either variety is over-ripe and peel is soft, use 1/2 cup Lemon Juice instead of 1 cup. (Be sure to discard any seeds.) This recipe makes 7 pounds of prize-winning Orange Marmalade.

Restaurants Told Procedure on New Point Allotments

After spending two days at the district office of the OPA in Portland, L. V. Hammock, chairman of the local War Price and Rationing board, announced today that the restaurants of this vicinity are being advised that all meals served during the next two months must not exceed 95 points per meal for meats and fats.

Many restaurants in the district are having difficulty in making their allotments last for the two month period, Hammock reported. The local War Price and Rationing board asks, he states, that these restaurants submit an accurate customer and dollar revenue account and if the record shows a 10 per cent increase in both customer and dollar revenue they will be granted an increase in points. As this is the only way for them to receive additional allotments, they are asked to fill out their report forms carefully and accurately.

The restaurant owners have been sent application for their November and December allotment and it is asked that they return them into the board office as soon as possible so that they may be processed before the book four registration takes place.

100,000 Hunters Await Bird Season Opening

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Game officials estimated today that approximately 100,000 hunters were awaiting the start of the bird-hunting season Friday and Saturday.

The waterfowl season opens Friday and excellent hunting was in prospect, especially in southern Oregon.

Federal fish and wildlife service officials estimated a million and a half ducks would be on lower Klamath lake, a million on Tule lake and more than 250,000 geese in the two areas.

The upland game bird season will open Saturday.

GOP Assn. Chief Backs C. of C. Head For Presidency

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Demen A. Watson, national chairman of the Republican Postwar Policy association, yesterday declared the organization "inactive" and said he, personally, would support Eric Johnston, of Spokane, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, for the republican nomination for president.

Watson, whose organization has advocated international cooperation with a council of nations and a world police force, said he had declared the association "inactive" because "we have attained our principal objectives."

He said the action was taken that individual members could support various presidential candidates. The association's charter will be retained, Watson said, so

that its activities can be resumed at any time.

In a telegram to Johnston Watson said, in part:

"I have made a careful survey all over the country and I am convinced that you are the man the republican party should nominate and elect as our next president. * * * I have contacted scores of republican leaders throughout the country and they approve 100 per cent. You can win the nomination and election."
