

Tough Practice Given Indians For Cottage Grove Foe

The Roseburg high school football team has been given a tough scrimmage practice this week in preparation for Friday night's game with Cottage Grove on Finlay field. Coach Turner has been working on new offensive plays, as well as plugging defensive weaknesses revealed in the University high school game last week, when the Indians suffered a 7-0 defeat.

Friday's game, which had been scheduled for the afternoon, was set for 8 p. m., following cancellation of the state Christian Endeavor convention. The night hour has been found more favorable for local and visiting fans and also eliminates interference with the school program.

Coach Turner's greatest difficulty has been in developing speed in the backfield. He has the weight and power needed for offensive plays into the line, but lacks the speed for gains around the flanks.

The Indians in their game with University high showed pass defense weaknesses, and lost the game when a 30-yard toss put the invaders on the Roseburg goal line.

By a 25 to 6 victory over Reedsport in the first game of the season, the Indians are still at the top of the percentage column in the southern half of the district. The game Friday night will count in percentage standings, as will the game with Springfield, to be played here Oct. 29. The game with University high school was a King's-X encounter. The top-flight team in the southern half of the district will meet the winner of the northern half in a post-schedule contest for the district title, with the winner to go into the state championship eliminations.

U. S. Subsidy Opposed By Potato Growers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14—(AP)—Potato growers and shippers from big-crop states, in conference here, expressed "unfavorable opposition" to government subsidies and appealed to their con-

gressmen to back their stand. Representative Frank Fellows (R-Mo.), after an opening session of the industry representatives, said the potato men opposed subsidies for many reasons, including "their belief that it would tend to socialize agriculture, because of the uncertainty and the endless bookkeeping for which the small farmer is ill-equipped."

The group also favored elimination of an OPA requirement that carloads of potatoes be accompanied by a manifest identifying the shipper, grade and purchaser.

Forms Sent Farmers for Sending in Food Stamps

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14—(AP)—Local rationing boards are mailing direct to farmers the report forms they need in submitting stamps collected from the sale of rationed foods, the OPA said.

Also in the packet are detailed instructions concerning the collection of stamps, which are required for farm sales of such foods as fresh or smoked meats, sausage, lard, butter and cheese. Farmers who have submitted stamps previously are automatically registered with their local boards and will receive the forms. Others may apply for them.

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Midway Battle Eased Jap Threat To Pacific Coast

SEATTLE, Oct. 14—(AP)—For the first time last night military authorities permitted it to be disclosed that the Pacific Northwest was in imminent danger of attack and without adequate defenses immediately after Pearl Harbor.

The Post-Intelligencer, in a story obtained from high army and navy officers, said: "The truth is that until the battle of Midway there was nothing between the people of the North Pacific coast and the Japanese but a thin line of offshore patrol boats and army forces, a few fighter planes and a handful of bombers, but nothing like the number needed to repel an approaching carrier-protected enemy task force."

A high army officer was quoted as having said: "If the Japs had not been frightened away at Dutch Harbor by the sudden appearance of a few unsuspected land-based American aircraft, and if they had not been turned back at Midway, there would have been Japanese troops in Oregon in 30 days."

The army is confident it could have prevented any serious advance into Washington from invasion beach heads, "the paper added."
