Postwar Planning Program Endorsed By Roseburg Lions

The Roseburg Lions club, at its regular weekly meeting in the Umpqua hotel last night, unanimously adopted a resolution proposed by Lion Bruce Elliott that the club endorse a proposal for a postwar planning program.

The resolution proposed that a committee composed of representatives from county court, the city council, the school board, the California-Oregon Power company, and other industrial organizations be formed to outline plans for financing and making much-needed improvements immediately after the war. It was suggested that a swimming pool, community hall, park, playground, Y. M. C. A., Oak Street bridge, city beautification, underground conduit for power and lights, and many other projects might well be undertaken and plans laid for their completion.

It was pointed out that the city of Eugene had made plans for improvements in that community and already was raising money for the needed projects. Anticipating industrial expansion in and around Roseburg, the club felt that immediate action locally was needed.

Mr. E. A. Britton, local 4-H club leader, gave a report on the Lions club program which was just concluded by which 4-H members were encouraged to produce livestock and garden produce in return for cash and livestock prizes.

"I wish," stated Mr. Britton, "that the members of this club could have an opportunity to see how boys and girls in Douglas county have been stimulated to produce better products and livestock by the program sponsored by the local Lions club." Mr. Britton outlined to the club the various activities engaged in by the boys and girls throughout the county.

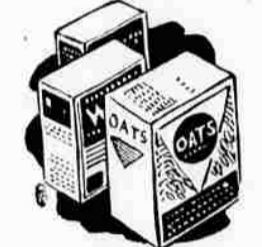

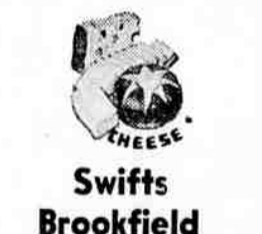
