GIVE + WAR FUND

An interesting three-day conference was held at Roseburg headquarters in which Home Service workers of the Red Cross throughout Douglas county were privileged to hear first-hand information on this important major phase of the Red Cross work from Miss Eleanor Herven, Home Service Field secretary for the Pacific coast. Miss Herven dealt with duties and problems of the Home Service branch.

There is an urgent need for volunteers in this field, as it handles problems involving the families of men and women in the armed services both here and abroad, she reported. As an example, in the event of an emergency in the family the Red Cross will endeavor to communicate with a service man or woman through the Red Cross field director at or nearest his station. In doing this the workers endeavor to obtain an answer within 24 hours. While they cannot obtain furloughs for service men and women, they do verify the need of furloughs or extension of the same.

On the other hand, Miss Herven said, if a man overseas has had no word from his family, he can appeal to his field director to utilize Red Cross services to assure him of their wellbeing. Miss Herven stressed the point that a worried soldier is not an asset to the military forces, so the Red Cross through this service contributes to the peace of mind of the men.

There are other forms of aid rendered by Home Service—any problems of the families of service men can be referred to the Red Cross for help; so let's not hesitate to inquire into what we can do in a volunteer way for the Red Cross. There's always something for willing hands at headquarters in the Perkins building," Miss Herven declared.

CROZIERVILLE, Pa., Oct. 16 (AP)—The former Mrs. Colin P. Kelly, Jr., widow of the nation's first air hero of the Second World war who was quietly married yesterday to Lt. (j. g.) J. Watson Pedlow was honeymooning today at a spot which she claimed would be equally as quiet and impossible to find.

The Rev. John Kneustab performed the double ring ceremony in the Calvary Episcopal church before immediate members of the family and a few close friends.

Lieutenant Pedlow, 35, a former Philadelphia chemical engineer, now is with the navy bureau of aeronautics. He and Mrs. Kelly, who is 26, met last year when he went to the west coast on a navy mission.

Just before the couple left on a ten-day honeymoon to an undisclosed destination, Mrs. Kelly said in an interview with a Philadelphia evening bulletin reporter, "Of course you can never forget the past and the past will always color the present. But I don't think you should let the past affect the present so much that there can be no future."

"Every woman whose husband is killed either in war or in peace has to face the problem of how to lead her life. She can retreat into a shell of memories or she can realize that life will and must go on."

Ward to Travel Out of Roseburg on OPA Duty

Frank Ward, former manager of the Montgomery Ward company store here, but who recently accepted a position in the price division of the OPA, has returned to Roseburg to make his headquarters while serving in his new capacity. The price division of the OPA heretofore has been secondary to rationing activities in importance, Ward said. In the future, however, it is planned to give increasing attention to price control as a means of preventing inflation.

Rationing Point Drop In Meats Demanded

PORTLAND, Oct. 16 (AP)—Members of a state feed committee demanded today an immediate drop in meat rationing points to enable the state's surplus livestock to be marketed without waste.

Fourteen per cent of Oregon's

cattle must be slaughtered to balance with the dwindling feed supply, the members said at the close of a three-day War Food administration conference.

A 5 per cent cattle reduction, recommended by national WFA specialists, would not be sufficient to solve Oregon's acute feed shortage, they said, recommending a higher reduction than the 11 per cent cut in spring pigs and 21 per cent in fall pigs suggested by the WFA.

The feed committee is composed of federal agricultural specialists and representatives of state farm groups.
