cally had for us.

If we win the Volturino battle, the Germans will have tried again to stop us, but without success. Nothing can be more depressing than an UNBROKEN series of defeats.

AP HENRY CASSIDY, cableing from Moscow, says the red army appears to be on the way to winning some of its GREATEST victories.

In the far south, the Russians have crossed the Molochna river and are fighting in the center of Melitopol, which lies astride the ONLY main line railroad out of the Crimea. (There's another minor military line, just completed.) They're well across the Dnieper at Kiev and are said to be trying to capture the city before the Germans have time to complete its destruction. At Kiev, the Germans are fighting desperately and rushing in reserves. "They're across the Dnieper at Kiev, and are closing in on the city. It's beginning to seem possible that the Germans may be thrown back from the line of the Dnieper and forced to make a new stand at the Bug. (See your map.)

LET'S turn now to our OWN South Pacific, whence great news comes.

MacArthur throws every bomb and fighter he can lay hands on into a great smash at Rabaul. Here are the statistics, as reported so far:

SUNK—17,000 tons of Jap shipping, including three destroyers, three merchant ships, 43 small cargo ships and 70 submarines; badly damaged a submarine and a 5,000-ton submarine tender, a 6,800-ton destroyer tender and a 7,000-ton cargo ship.

These sunk and damaged vessels constitute a small navy in themselves.

A total of 177 Jap planes, estimated at 60% of the Jap air forces on the Rabaul airbases, was destroyed or severely damaged.

Loss to our side FIVE PLANES.

MacArthur says: "I think we've broken Rabaul's back and gained mastery of the air over the Solomons and adjacent waters."

General Kenney, our air force commander in the South Pacific, says: "It was the greatest air armada ever amassed in this area and makes a TURNING POINT in the war in the South Pacific."

FOR what all this heavy fighting on both sides of the world means, go back to Grant's campaign before Richmond, when he was CLOSING IN to break Lee's back.

He BROKE Lee's back, and ended the war. It took sustained and bloody fighting to do it.

That's the way wars are won and ended.

DON'T jump to rosy conclusions that the fighting will be over and the boys home by Christmas. That's silly. Only a moron could entertain such a thought.

But also don't let ANYBODY for propaganda or any other rea-

And while we are on the subject of the News-Review's business, we might mention that Harlan Carter, the manager of our commercial printing department, has called attention to an oversight.

"When we had half our crew in the hospital or on sick leave and we were having all kinds of manpower trouble, you told all our readers about it," Carter chided us. "Now why don't you tell them that we have our entire force back at work, that everything is rolling smoothly in the mechanical section, that the job printing department is completing a bunch of big, rush orders, and that we are back in a position to do job printing promptly?"

Of course, we wouldn't dare say anything like that, because just as sure as we did something unfortunate would happen. We even knocked on wood when Carter made his suggestion.

Why, Carter even wanted us to tell you that his job printing department is more efficiently manned and better stocked than ever before.

"People ought to know," he said, "that we are now in a position to give prompt service. We have been printing the directory for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company and we have had some other big orders that have kept us working overtime. Consequently a few small orders have not been delivered as promptly as usual, but now we can take care of them."

Of course, we told Carter that such a statement would be advertising, and he wanted to know if we didn't believe in advertising; so of course we started to tell him that the News-Review is the best advertising medium to be found anywhere but he butted in to tell us we should inform the people that if they need envelopes they should order a long time ahead.

"I've had another letter from the factory telling me they won't promise delivery on envelope orders under 60 days for regular sizes and 90 days for special sizes," Carter said. College of Pacific Tops Coast Teams With 5 Triumphs

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18. (AP)—Once again, Stanford Amos Stagg and his crack College of the Pacific team find themselves in leading roles in the Pacific Coast's biggest football show of the week.

Pacific, fresh from its stunning 16-7 win over the seemingly unbeatable Del Monte Navy Pre-Flight eleven, tackled the unscathed University of Southern California Trojans at Los Angeles.

The Trojans made it four in a row with a lopsided win over University of San Francisco last weekend. The score of 34 to 0 probably could have been doubt, if Coach Cravath put his full team strength on the field.

The Pacific Tigers, likewise undefeated, won their fifth game of the season and produced far and away better team coordination than the star-studded Del Monte squad which enjoyed 5 to 1 favoritism at the kickoff.

The undefeated fourth air force team from March field travels to Seattle to face orphaned University of Washington, represented by a first rate team and with but few opponents to play.

The army squad skidded by the naval training station of San Diego last week with a 7-0 win but its previous victories have been so one-sided they hardly could be called contests. One instance was the 47-7 win over U.C.L.A.

Washington also scored heavily in its only two games, the last being 47-12 over the Spokane

ally service command on Oct. 9. Other games this weekend will oppose University of California and St. Mary's Navy Pre-Flight at Berkeley and the Alameda Coast Guard and Pleasanton Navy Blue Jackets at San Francisco.

California added another victory Saturday with a 13-0 setback to U.C.L.A. Williamette defeated a team of army trainees from the University of Oregon, 26 to 6.

Urgent Campaign Begun in Douglas For War Recruits

One of the most intensive and gigantic recruiting campaigns in the history of the United States army was introduced in Douglas county today as Mrs. Ethel Roselund, chairman of the Legion auxiliary recruiting committee, announced that her organization would sponsor locally the Women's Army Corps' nationwide "All States" enrollment program, which is expected to produce some 70,000 much needed recruits for duty with the War.

"Prompting the campaign," explained Mrs. Roselund, "is the hope of replacing army casualties, thus far, with women soldiers. It will be the obligation of each county to recruit as many of its women as it has suffered battle casualties since December 7, 1941. Some ten soldiers from Douglas county have been reported killed or missing. We must replace each of them with a War enrollee."

Another feature of the drive will be the forming of War companies representing each of the 48 states. All women recruited in this county will be assigned to a special Oregon unit and will wear the insignia of the state on their uniforms as well as march under its colors.

As part of the Oregon and southern Washington recruiting district program, a contest will be held for school girls between the ages of 10 and 16. Prizes will be offered locally and by the district for the best 100 word essay on "Why I Would Like to Join the War and Replace a Battle Casualty."

Although the campaign will not end until December 7th, Douglas county will endeavor to reach its goal during the visit of the novel War Carnival Caravan, which will be here for two days, Wednesday and Thursday, October 27 and 28. This traveling unit was previewed at the Portland Invasion exposition and is now touring the state in behalf of the important recruiting program.

The temptations of Jesus were intensely real. They concerned the vital issues of his life. They presented worthwhile things in life.
