Riddler, where they made arrangements for the purchase of a pure bred Duroc Jersey gilt. Next they went to Independence to the farm of Chas. A. The group spent considerable time looking for some Guernsey heifers as well as some Hereford heifers but did not find any for sale at any of the farms listed.

Two Pilots Die in Crashes of Planes

(By the Associated Press)

Air crashes claimed the lives of two pilots in Washington and British Columbia over the weekend while the fate of a third plane still was unknown by the 13th naval district. A fourth, pilot of a civil air patrol plane which made a forced landing in eastern Washington, escaped uninjured.

A navy plane based at the Pacific naval air station crashed and burned just across the Snake river Saturday night, killing the pilot instantly. His name was withheld pending notification of next of kin.

Hundreds of persons watched an unidentified craft, believed to be American, plunge into the ocean off Victoria, B. C., Saturday. Rescue boats reported only bits of wreckage floating on the water when they reached the scene.

In Seattle, district officers reported a small navy plane missing from a northwest naval air base since Saturday afternoon but said they had not determined whether the plane was the same as that seen to crash into the sea near Victoria.

Bad weather forced Cloyd Territory of Spokane, civil air patrol pi-

lot, to "crash land" his plane 10 miles north of Dayton, according to the Spokane air service command. He was reported uninjured.
