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Gasoline Phase Of Absenteeism Noted by Board

Many local employers are complaining of the increase in absenteeism among their employees. L. V. Hammock, chairman of the local War Price and Rationing board, announced today and these employees are blaming the tire and gasoline situation for this absenteeism. Up to this time the local board has tried to cooperate fully with the companies of this district and their employees and in many cases have allowed a gasoline ration for an employee riding alone, regardless of the number of miles he drove, Hammock said.

"Now that this has been declared a gasoline shortage area, some adjustment must be made in these ration and all applicants must show a decrease in the miles to be driven," the chairman announced. "They must show a ride-sharing program and also must have all applications certified by their employers."

"The gasoline and tire situation in this area has become so grave that all consumers must help to conserve these commodities."

All supplemental applications now in the office are being held until October 20, when the new adjustments in coupon value will be made known to the boards, Hammock states.

Timothy J. Hogan, Vet Of World War 1, Passes

Timothy J. Hogan, 49, World war 1 veteran and resident of Grand Junction, Colorado, died at the Veterans hospital here last Saturday. He was born in South Dakota, February 9, 1894, and enlisted in the U. S. army during the last war, serving as private, Company I, 3rd battalion.

Surviving are his widow, Myrtle Hogan, and a brother, Ed F. Hogan of Portland, Oregon. The body was forwarded last night by the Douglas Funeral Home to Portland, where services and interment will take place.
