

GOP President In '44 Predicted By Party Chief

MISSOULA, Mont., Oct. 19.—(AP)—A republican victory in the 1944 presidential campaign was predicted last night by Chairman Harrison E. Spangler of the republican national committee, despite what he said were claims by "10,000 New Deal press agents" that the party in power would win again.

Speaking at a banquet which closed a one-day conference of Montana republicans, Spangler said:

"Since last fall there has been much evidence that the tide running in favor of republicanism, good government and the maintenance of American institutions definitely is on the increase.

Spangler, who will preside today at a conference of GOP party leaders from nine states today, charged that the present administration is attempting to supplant the states' rights system of government provided by the constitution with a form of centralized federal government "like those we are fighting."

"This country is following the identical pattern which in Germany produced Hitler, whose first step was to do away with the legislative branch of the government, just as the administration itself dictated our laws since the early '30's by having them approved by a rubber stamp servant congress."

Republican party representatives from Montana, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, North Dakota and Colorado will discuss 1944 campaign plans today.

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Outlook Good for 3-Power Accord at Moscow Meeting

MOSCOW, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Izvestia, soviet newspaper, said today that the coming three-power conference—in which United States Secretary of State Hull will take part—would play an important part in organizing the final defeat of Germany.

The newspaper insisted that military questions must come before other problems such as post-war cooperation, as did Pravda, the communist party newspaper, in a recent issue, and declared that "undoubtedly the question of decisive reduction in the length of the war and of victory in the shortest possible time is tied up inseparably with the problem of opening a second front in western Europe."

The article reflected confidence that an accord could be reached on both military and political questions.

The article did not mention the question of soviet frontiers or the status of the Baltic states which Pravda previously had said could not be discussed.

Another sign of a generally "warm atmosphere for the conference of British, American and soviet officials was given in Premier Stalin's meeting last night with Donald Nelson, chief of the United States War Production board, to survey soviet production. Stalin, who spent much time last summer and this fall on the front, has been accessible to foreign visitors but rarely recently.

Congress Inclines To Sales Tax Plan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Although no one can predict with any certainty what form the new wartime revenue law will take, the trend on Capitol Hill today is toward adoption of a national retail sales tax—probably 5 per cent, with no exemptions.

A member of the tax-drafting house ways and means committee, who heretofore has been cool toward the sales tax principle, said "it seems to be creeping up on us. The proponents have gotten in some pretty good licks in the last few days."

A 5 per cent sales tax would yield about \$3,500,000,000 in new revenue annually. The treasury asked \$10,500,000,000. A move has started in congress to make up the difference by slashing government costs.

Senator Thomas (D-Okla.) interpreted this economy mood as meaning "we are through with blank check and lump sum appropriations."

His statement accented the decision of the senate appropriations committee to enlarge its staff of investigators for more careful examination of future appropriation demands.

Suit Ending Clears Way For Coos Oil Prospect

PORTLAND, Oct. 19.—(AP)—The way was cleared today for early testing of the Coos county area for oil.

Walter E. Marmon, president of Coast Petroleum company, announced yesterday the settlement of his company's suit against Coos county and the Phillips Petroleum company, which was reported at Bandon yesterday to be planning to drill the Westport arch southwest of Marshfield.

Marmon's company had charged irregularities in leases to 8,000 acres of land taken up by the Phillips corporation. He said the settlement provides for immediate drilling of deep test wells by the Phillips company and for a portion of any oil or gas found to go to Coast Petroleum.

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Victims of Incident Test Still in Hospital

TACOMA, Oct. 16.—(AP)—The nine victims of Thursday evening's blackout practice were still in hospitals today to which they had been taken after being overcome by smoke created in a building to simulate a blackout "incident."

The group included seven boys, who had been posing as "incident" victims, and two civilian defense officers who had helped

the boys out of the smoke-filled building. All were believed to be recovering, although one, Donald Fisher, 12, was still "in bad shape," according to hospital authorities.
