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Plant Cabbage, Cauliflower For Fall Vegetables

It is not too late to start a Victory Garden this fall. Many amateur gardeners are misled in thinking that the only time to start a garden is during the spring season.

As a matter of fact, in many localities, there's a better chance of succeeding during the autumn months than early in the year, because the fall rains practically solve the irrigation problem.

If you are not acquainted with growing crops at this time of the year don't let that stop you. Within a few weeks you may be eating fresh vegetables grown in your own backyard.

Drainage, Sun Vital

Drainage is especially important during the cooler months. There are dozens of vegetables that will succumb if standing water remains for any prolonged period in the vicinity of their roots. Drowning need not be an uncommon occurrence. The strange thing is that it can happen in your own backyard.

Heavy soils usually present a difficult problem of drainage, because moisture finds it difficult to penetrate through the various constituents of a heavy clay or adobe compost. Conversely, a sandy tract is extremely porous and water seeps through it rapidly.

Heavy ground should be corrected prior to sowing seed. This step may not be essential at any other time of the year, but heavy land may offer obstacles during the fall season. Peat moss is excellent for correcting heavy soil, and it is still available.

Your fall Victory Garden should be planned so that the individual plants obtain the maximum of sunshine. Deprived of this they may never attain maturity and, if they do, a stunted or dwarfed shape may result. During the late autumn days when sunlight is at a premium

this matter of exposure becomes a subject of prime importance. **What To Plant**

Cauliflower and cabbage may be considered as excellent selections for growing during the fall season. Furrows should be formed about thirty to thirty-six inches apart. These depressions may be about four or five inches wide and probably from seven to nine inches deep, depending on the type of soil and the exact growing locale.

The seedlings may be set in the bottom of the furrow and after being planted the soil should be firmed well about the roots. Then let water run slowly through the furrows; if there is any great force the young seedlings may be uprooted and all your care and attention will be in vain.

Possibly the cabbage or cauliflower plants will wilt, but that should not be taken too seriously. Actually, it takes about a week for the seedlings to perk up after being transplanted. Be sure that irrigation is provided every few days for the first week or so. After that the plants will tend to become established and able to cope with more hazardous growing conditions.

60-Bomber Loss Over Schweinfurt Held "Incidental"

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19—(AP)—Gen. H. H. Arnold, chief of the army air forces, speaking as if in reply to discussion of the loss of 60 American bombers over Schweinfurt, Germany, asserted yesterday the loss was "incidental" and added: "we're getting the upper hand in every theater in this war."

"Now don't conclude that the war is going to be over soon, or that it's about over, or anything of the kind. But that we are getting the upper hand is clear," Arnold said.

Germany, he said, is desperately turning every effort toward fighters—to defend against growing allied bombing.

Japan "now has her fifth or sixth team" in the air over the southwest Pacific.

"Regardless of our losses," Arnold declared, "I'm ready to send over replacement crews for every one lost—and at the same time keep building up our strength."

His dissertation was pegged to the big United States Eighth army air force raid October 14 on Schweinfurt in which 60 big bombers went down carrying 593 crew members and at an estimated plane loss, in dollars, of \$18,000,000.

"You can't run a war on a dollar basis," the general expostulated at one point. "But," he added, "if you want to put it on that basis, consider the dollars lost in what we destroy."

Ground Invasion Needed

The "main objective" of the allied air war over Europe," Arnold said, "is to make it easier for ground troops to go in, in the final dash, and save thousands of lives."

Interrupted with a question as to whether he believed air power alone could bring Germany to her knees, Arnold said it was possible but that ground forces still would be required to police. He continued:

"In the case of Schweinfurt, we had to get it. We already had knocked out the big ballbearing plant at Paris. The Paris and Schweinfurt plants were the Germans' biggest. Now we have got Schweinfurt."

He said that smaller ballbearing plants throughout Germany would be utilized and that German "long-haired" scientists doubtless are busy developing new ways and means of meeting the needs of the war machine.

Garden Success Needs All-Year Battle on Pests

It's impossible to grow a successful garden unless a rigorous spraying or dusting program is carried out. Bugs are always present whether the season is summer, fall or winter; whether you live in Oregon or California. Sections that have warm or mild winters may suffer more from insects than areas possessed of a prolonged frost period.

Ants may be a serious pest. They should not be allowed to gain a stronghold for they breed by the millions and usually are the companions of aphids and mealybugs. Most of the ant controls are poisonous and should be kept away from babies and pets. Although doctors disagree on just how much ant poisoning is required to cause dire results, there's little use in taking chances with children around. This safety measure holds true of all other types of poison used for insect control.

Spraying only once or twice a year is inadequate. To control the tremendous infestation of bugs, more regular treatment is required. In certain sections spraying even twice a month may not be too frequent if any measure of control is to be gained. Be careful that you spray the under parts of the leaves as well as the top of the plant. The specimen being treated should be completely enveloped with the spray as often the bugs lurk in the joints, and underneath the leaves.

Besides the more common garden insects, watch out also for the night prowlers such as snails and slugs. They may not be in evidence in the daytime, but they usually leave a wide wake of destruction behind them.

Return of Loyal Japs to Civilian Privileges Urged

LAWRENCE, Kas., Oct. 19—(AP)—Dillon S. Myer, director of the War Relocation authority, told a Rotary club audience yesterday that 21,000 loyal Japanese-Americans have been released from relocation centers this year, and that 70,000 more are eligible for return to civilian life.

Myer said WRA is encouraging the 70,000 to return to normal activities in communities away from the Pacific coast, where the ban against their residence is still in force.

"Many of them feel they are too old to make the adjustment to new jobs and new communities," Myer said, "a great many were substantial businessmen or farmers. Many of the evacuees are uncertain of their futures outside the centers."

Myer said release of the loyal Japanese was desirable not only for economy and manpower reasons, but also because thousands of children now in the centers should grow up in more American surroundings.

Citing the excellent war record of Japanese-American troops in combat, Myer urged that U. S. communities receive the Japanese-Americans as citizens whose loyalties had been subject to the most rigorous tests.

All Japanese aliens and Japanese-Americans whose loyalty remains questionable are still segregated in a northern California camp, Myer said.
