GOP Victory in 1944 Predicted by Spangler

PORTLAND, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Harrison E. Spangler, republican national chairman, predicts a republican victory in 1944.

In a brief stop in Portland while on a nationwide tour, Spangler accused the president of shifting toward the right in an attempt to line up votes for next year.

"He usually makes some gestures in that direction before each election. He tries to keep Harry Hopkins in the basement just before the voting," he told an interviewer.

Spangler added, "any candidate nominated by the republicans for president will win."
