Navy Recruiter Dated in Roseburg

The Roseburg navy recruiting station in the chamber of commerce office will be open all day Saturday, October 30. Those who desire information on enlistment in any branch of the navy can contact Chief Specialist W. E. Bell at the local recruiting station or by calling 370.

Young men who wish information on V-12 examination and how they can qualify for this training should come in Saturday. Complete information on the qualifications necessary will be available. Young women who are interested in finding out how they can serve their country and really contribute toward the war effort should call or come in to the recruiting station during the day; or, if they cannot come in during the day, evening or Sunday appointments can be made. Any young woman between the ages of 20 and 35 with at least 2 years of high school and no dependents under 18 years of age have an opportunity to enlist.

Young men of 17 years of age who desire to learn how they can serve in the navy and what will be necessary to enlist should use this opportunity to see Chief Bell when he is in Roseburg.

Wives Urge Drafting of Job-Quitting Husbands

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 29.—(AP)—State selective service headquarters has received letters from all parts of the country about a story released two weeks ago, telling of a Portland shipyard worker who quit his job when he became 38 years old, but who was drafted anyway.

This man had left his wife and children, and now the family will receive support money from the government.

Two wives, one in South Carolina and the other in Arkansas, wrote to Col. Elmer V. Wooton, state selective service director, asking him to draft their husbands, who had quit defense jobs because they considered themselves draft-proof.

Colonel Wooton had to explain to them that his jurisdiction includes only Oregon.

R. H. S. to Battle Springfield 11 in Weather Handicap

The Roseburg high school Indians will battle the Springfield Millers on Finlay field at 8 o'clock tonight, in a game which promises to carry a weather handicap against the local squad. Prospects of a muddy field, handicapping speed and providing an advantage for the team with weight superiority, is expected to give a playing edge to the invaders, who reportedly operate their running plays behind strong interference, thus reducing the need for speed.

Roseburg, on the other hand, with an inexperienced backfield, has been concentrating on speed. The boys have had trouble handling the ball, losing many chances for gain because of fumbles, and with a wet, slippery ball in play the opportunities for fumbles are materially increased.

The Indians, however, have been drilling hard this week in offensive strategy and may be able to spring some surprises on the Millers, who are proclaimed by observers to comprise one of the strongest teams of the district.

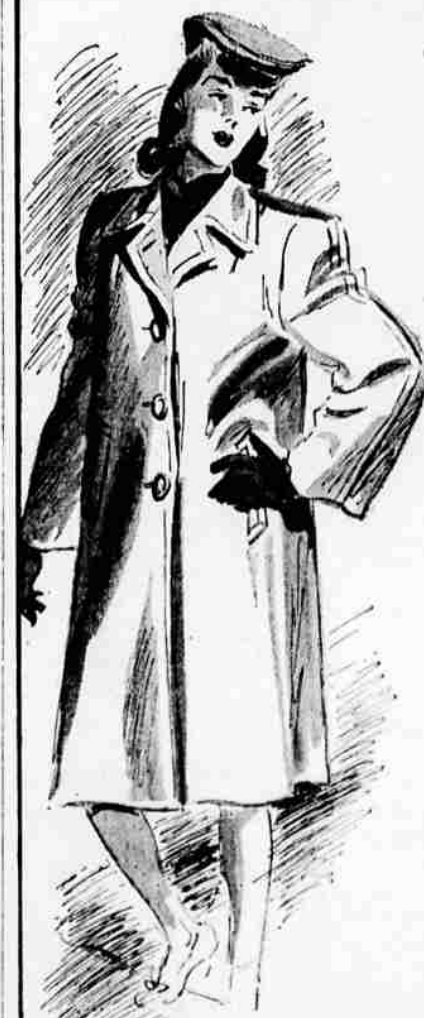
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THE OLD JUDGE SAYS...
