The action, taken in an amendment to the meats-fats rationing regulations, allows 25 pounds of canned fish for each member of the fisherman's family. If it is sold, points must be turned over to the fisherman's local rationing board.

Ration Dates and Data

RATION BOOK NO. 1

SUGAR

OCTOBER 31—Expiration date for canning sugar stamps No. 15 and 16, each good for 5 pounds.

NOVEMBER 1—Expiration date for stamp No. 14, five pounds.

NOVEMBER 1—Stamp 29, book 4, good for 5 pounds sugar through January 15, 1944.

SHOES

Expiration date of stamp No. 18 for one pair of shoes extended indefinitely.

NOVEMBER 1—"Airplane" stamps No. 1 in book 3 good for one pair of shoes, expiration date indefinite.

RATION BOOK NO. 2

NOVEMBER 20—Expiration date of blue stamps X, Y and Z (processed foods).

RATION BOOK NO. 3

(Brown stamps) for purchase of meats, fats, etc.

OCTOBER 30—Expiration date of brown stamps C, D, E and F.

DECEMBER 4—Expiration date of brown stamps G, H, J and K.

G becomes valid October 24, H on October 31, J on November 7, K on November 14. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

STOVES

Purchaser must get certificates at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL

Fuel dealers must deliver by priorities based on consumer needs.

GASOLINE

NOVEMBER 21—Expiration date of No. 8 stamps in A book, each good for 3 gallons.

TIRES

Cars with C ration books have tires inspected every 3 months; B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. September 30 next inspection deadline or every 5,000 miles, whichever occurs first.

RATION BOOK NO. 4

(Processed Fruits and Vegetables)

NOVEMBER 1—Green stamps A, B and C Valid through December 20.

OCTOBER 31—Blue and green stamps will be used to buy jams, jellies, preserves and fruit spreads.

FUEL OIL—Period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rations last through January 3, 1944. Coupons with gallonage printed on face valid until expiration date shown on coupon sheet.

Scout Honor Court, Executive Board Meet Dated Here

The November meeting of the Douglas district Boy Scout Court of Honor will be held at the courthouse Monday evening, November 8, according to W. H. Gerretsen, district advancement chairman. The court will meet bi-monthly on the second Monday of each month during the year. It is at the Court of Honor that Scouts advance in rank and receive their awards.

Troops are reminded by Gerretsen that it is necessary to conduct a troop board of review prior to filing applications for advancement with the Boy Scout headquarters in Eugene.

The executive board of the Willamette area Boy Scout council will hold its regular fall meeting in Roseburg on November 17, according to B. C. Elliott, local district scout chairman and a member of the board. The scout council supervises all Boy Scout work in Douglas, Lane, Benton, Lincoln, Coos and Curry counties. Headquarters are in Eugene.

"In order to help solve transportation problems and to assure a full and representative attendance at the meeting of the executive board, Dr. J. F. Cramley, council president, has asked that the meeting be held in Roseburg," said Elliott. In addition to Roseburg men, members of the board will attend from Eugene, Coquille, Marshfield, and Reedsport.

The executive board is the legislative and policy making body of the entire Scout council and most of its meeting have heretofore been held in Eugene. The Roseburg district acting as hosts will arrange the details of the meeting, assisted by K. A. Wells, Scout executive from Eugene and R. E. Kalaher, assistant Scout executive from Marshfield.

It will be a dinner meeting at 6:30 and the first part of the meeting will be held in conjunction with the Roseburg Lions club at the Umpqua hotel.

Noted Scotch Preacher, Wife Date Services Here

Archie McNeill, noted young Scotch preacher and now director of the Christian Service center in Portland, and his talented wife, Evangeline Duff McNeill, arrived in Roseburg today to make preparations for opening a two weeks' evangelistic session at the First Presbyterian church. The services will open Sunday morning and, with the exception of Saturdays, will continue through November 14. Mrs. McNeill, a concert harpist and violinist, will assist her husband with the service. Mr. McNeill is the son of the late Rev. John McNeill, world-famous Scotch evangelist.

Mrs. Nels Osmundsen Wins Insurance Action

MARSHFIELD, Oct. 30.—Circuit Judge Dal M. King Friday ordered a directed verdict in the suit of Mrs. Ella Osmundsen, who brought action against the New York Life Insurance company for \$2000 following the death of her husband, Nels, several months ago. Osmundsen was drowned when he dove into the sea three miles south of Bandon in an attempt to recover a wallet that had fallen overboard while he was fishing.

The company claimed his action was a deliberate attempt at suicide and that deceased had needlessly exposed himself to danger. The directed verdict ordered the insurance company to pay the full amount sought by the plaintiff, together with costs of trial and \$500 attorney fees.

I have seen the soldiers come down from the ships and stand in long lines on the docks, their "B" bags beside them and their rifles slung over their shoulders. They have come to a new country and it is strange to them. They are puzzled and although only a little time from home they are homesick. I have seen the supplies come in by the hundred shiploads, locomotives and tanks and trucks—acres of boxed food and great mounds of hams, shiploads of bombs stacked in from keel to hatch and all materials that we need at home. Steel for bridges and buildings, food for our own people, material enough to make all America well fed and well housed and well clothed. And all this slumped on the docks of a foreign country. I have seen the men climb into the Fortress in the early morning and fly away waving with elaborate non-chalance and I have seen the gap in the mess when they did not come back. I have seen the hospitals with the mangled men, the legless and blind, the fingerless hands and the burned faces. I have seen children hauled out of a blasted building. In God's name what is it for except to make the world free. Who dare not give his money to fight this wrong. Amen.
